ROLLING IN BATON ROUGE

The United States Bowling Congress Open Championships returned to Baton Rouge, Louisiana, for the third time in 2025, drawing more than 11,600 teams to compete in Red Stick.

BY THE NUMBERS

The 121st edition of the USBC Open Championships was contested inside the Raising Cane's River Center, which featured a custom installation to create a 54-lane tournament venue. The convention center previously hosted the Open Championships in 2005 and 2012 and served as the home of the 2017 USBC Women's Championships.

The 2025 event was contested across 150 consecutive days in Baton Rouge and welcomed more than 58,000 bowlers. The final team tally registered at 11,684, making 2025 the largest event since the tournament's last visit to Baton Rouge in 2012.

When the final ball was rolled, a total of 32 competitors claimed titles across three average-based divisions (Regular, Standard and Classified). Seven of those 32 also added another Eagle to their mantel.

MCDOWELL IS PERFECT IN SINGLES WIN

Marc McDowell of Black River Falls, Wisconsin, recorded his third win at the Open Championships in 2025, posting a 795 series in Regular Singles at the River Center.

The 62-year-old right-hander's path to the big number involved a couple of twists and turns, but he managed to close his 38th appearance with 16 strikes on the way to games of 299, 196 and 300.

A 4 pin stood on his final delivery of Game 1, but things quickly shifted for the five-time Professional Bowlers Association Tour champion. Through eight frames of Game 2, he had just three strikes and two opens.

McDowell made a ball change on his fill for Game 2 and decided to stick with it for Game 3. The lead heading into competition that morning was 793 (Richie Benninghoff of South Bend, Indiana), leaving the margin for error at a minimum. He didn't need it, though.

The perfect finish allowed McDowell to become the first champion in Regular Singles to roll both a 299 and 300 during the same set, and he also became the first player in more than 40 years to win the title with a game south of 200 (1984 – Neal Young of Louisville, Kentucky).

He also joined his father, Larry McDowell, with a perfect

performance at the Open Championships. Larry rolled his 300 in doubles during the 1997 event in Huntsville, Alabama.

The victory marked his second win in Baton Rouge, too. McDowell's first Eagle came during the 2005 event in Team All-Events alongside USBC Hall of Famers Jeff Richgels and Mike Shady, Gail Myers Jr. and Steve Richter. The same group recorded the win in Regular Team during the 2011 event in Reno, Nevada.

ANDERSON ADDS SECOND EAGLE IN ALL-EVENTS

Andrew Anderson of Chesterfield Township, Michigan, had quite the year in 2025.

He started in January by making Team USA for the sixth time, and his exploits during the PBA Tour season were well documented – a pair of titles to partner with a runner-up finish at the U.S. Open – during a resurgence for the 2018 PBA Player of the Year.

During his trip to Baton Rouge in June, Anderson put together the top performance across nine games at the River Center to claim his second victory at the Open Championships. The talented right-hander recorded sets of 763 in team, 754 in doubles and 667 in singles to win Regular All-Events with a 2,184 total.

Anderson's 763 series was the top individual number for 2025 on the demanding 39-foot team pattern, and he looked primed to run away with the win after closing doubles with 279. He had to navigate some opens through his first two games of singles but closed with an impressive 244 to take the lead, and eventually the title, by 26 pins.

The six-time PBA Tour champion won his first Eagle in 2021, recording the top score in Regular Singles with an 802 series. He's also rolled a pair of 300s at the event. Anderson connected for his first 300 in singles during the 2019 event and added the second during team competition in 2022.

HANSEN HARDCAPES HISTORIC IN LOUISIANA

For the second consecutive year at the Open Championships, the team to beat in the Classified Division has been Hansen Hardscapes of Alexandria, Minnesota.

At the 2024 event in Las Vegas, the group of Ashley Ohlrogge, Jessica Cook, Lauren Johnson, Christopher Cook and Eric Ohlrogge posted the winning total with a score of 2,607.

The team had a slightly different look in 2025 as Johnson was unable to attend. David Nelson stepped in as the fifth for Baton Rouge, helping the crew recreate that winning feeling.



They rolled games of 843, 743 and 836 to win Classified Team with a 2,422 total at the River Center, becoming the first group to defend a team title in the division.

Eric Ohlrogge led the way with a 565 series and was followed by Jessica Cook (496), Ashley Ohlrogge (494), Christopher Cook (452) and Nelson (415).

Along with the return trip to the winner's circle, Ashley Ohlrogge and Jessica Cook also became the first female competitors to win two titles at the Open Championships.

VALIDATING WIN IN TEAM ALL-EVENTS

The quintet of James Tucker III, William Welch, Joseph Vrobel, Chad Kloss and 2019 Regular Singles champion Mitch Beasley delivered a dominating performance and avenged several close calls from the past to collect the Team All-Events title in 2025.

The group – known as Bowlers Headquarters – recorded the largest margin of victory in Baton Rouge, rolling to the win by 166 pins. They posted the only score with five digits at the River Center, finishing with a 10,053 combined score.

Four of the five teammates – Tucker, Welch, Kloss and Beasley – united at the tournament for the first time in 2019, netting instant results. Beasley posted 812 to win singles while the group finished fifth in Team All-Events.

Vrobel joined the action in 2021, helping Bowlers Headquarters to a runner-up finish in Regular Team and fourth in Team All-Events.

Top 10s were a common theme for the talented group, but an elusive team victory continued to fall just outside of their collective grasp until their performance in Louisiana.

In team, they finished with 3,242 to finish fifth in the Regular Division. They continued strong in doubles the following day with 3,440. The scoring pace slowed at the start of singles, but the team rallied in the final game – firing 1,252 – to finish with 3,371.

Tucker led the run with an all-events total of 2,092 and was followed by Welch (2,057), Kloss (1,987), Beasley (1,971) and Vrobel (1,946).

ILLINOIS CREW CLAIMS REGULAR TEAM CROWN

The members of Phat Kidz Crew of Pekin, Illinois, each earned their first Eagle by recording the victory in Regular Team at the 2025 event with a 3,300 total.

The team – featuring Travis Anderson, Andrew Stone, Anthony Recsник, Thomas Barnwell and Steven Taylor – had the longest tenure at the top of the leaderboard in the Regular Division, taking the lead on April 13 after posting games of 1,118, 1,140 and 1,042 in Baton Rouge.

The strong start certainly was significant for the team representing Central Illinois. The 1,118 was the highest opening game in 2025, and their 1,140 registered in the top 15 overall for the year.

Their pace slowed down in Game 3, but the team battled together until the end on the strength of four strikes in the ninth and a clean 10th frame.

Barnwell led Phat Kidz Crew with 715 and was followed by Stone (705), Taylor (656), Recsник (632) and Anderson (592).

The group also finished the year in third place for Team All-Events with a 9,879 total.

This homegrown team – which added Recsник to the lineup in 2025 – had put together several strong performances leading up to their breakout win. They finished sixth in Team All-Events in 2018, 11th in Team All-Events in 2023 and 11th in Regular Team in 2024.

ROBILLARD, CLEMENTS VICTORIOUS IN DOUBLES

Joseph Robillard and Robert Clements built on the legacy of The Lakers in 2025, bringing home the win in Regular Doubles with a 1,494 total at the River Center.

Robillard, of Farmington, Minnesota, had games of 245, 226 and 279 for a 750 series while Clements, of Plymouth, Minnesota, nearly matched the effort with 268, 244 and 232 for 744.

Taking the lead – and eventually the title – featured some final-frame excitement for the pair. Clements started his 10th frame by leaving a 7 pin and covering the spare, putting Robillard in a must-strike situation to pass the 1,483 posted by Florida's Scott Anderson and Nathan Samuels.

Robillard connected for the first strike and added a second for good measure, helping push them to the top spot by 11 pins.

In addition to the excitement in doubles, Robillard nearly joined Clements with a 300 at the Open Championships in his final game of singles, rolling 299. Clements' 300 took place during singles at the 2018 event in Syracuse, New York.

The two-team group representing The Lakers during the 2025 event started with five Eagle winners and closed the event with seven. Robillard and Clements now join USBC Hall of Famers Sam Lantto and Todd Savoy, John Eiss, Gary Green and Chuck Vashaw in the winner's circle at the Open Championships.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT

One of the most exciting parts of the Open Championships is knowing a winning score can be rolled at any time. Day 1, Day 150 or any spot between can yield a performance worthy of the record book.

The longest wait (took the lead March 13 – Day 13) and quickest turnaround (rolled July 20 – Day 142) belonged in the Standard Division during the 2025 event.

Jeff Dent of Glade Hill, Virginia, posted the number to beat in Standard All-Events within the first two weeks in Baton Rouge, putting together scores of 695 in team, 655 in singles and 631



in doubles for a 1,981 score.

Dent, making his 21st tournament appearance, bested his previous top score in all-events by more than 140 pins (1,838 in 2016) to record the win.

Kory Cockrum of Grand Junction, Colorado, only had to wait eight days to see his score stand in Standard Singles.

He rolled games of 278, 244 and 224 at the River Center to collect the win with a 746 series.

BIG WINS IN BATON ROUGE

The big number in Standard Team belonged to a Colorado-based group at the 2025 Open Championships.

The members of Leave Your Mark Pro Shop #3 – Joshua Dundas, Michelle Schafer, Amanda Nowasell, Russ Schafer and Steven McCracken – combined for games of 963, 991 and 891 in Baton Rouge to take home the victory with a 2,845 total.

McCracken – who also rolled a 299 during doubles in 2025 – led the way with a 698 series. Russ Schafer added 614 and was followed by Nowasell (570), Dundas (550) and Michelle Schafer (413).

A brother-and-sister team captured the victory in Standard Doubles as Brandyn and Emily Cox worked together for a 1,290 total at the River Center.

Brandyn, of Chesterfield, Virginia, was perfect in Game 3 of the performance, rolling games of 269, 203 and 300 for a 772 series. Emily, of North Dinwiddie, Virginia, added scores of 189, 159 and 170 for 518.

The family trend continued in Classified Doubles with the father-and-daughter pairing of Shane and Alaina Moore taking the top spot with 1,172.

Representing Reno, Nevada, Shane used games of 223, 264 and 201 to pace the way with a 688 set. Alaina finished strong to put an exclamation point on the performance with games of 145, 133 and 206 for a 484 series.

Kenneth Hurst of Dayton, Ohio, was clutch down the stretch on his way to victory in Classified Singles at the 2025 Open Championships.

After starting his set with 235 and 178, Hurst delivered four consecutive strikes – starting in the seventh frame to the first shot of the 10th – at the end of Game 3 to close with 232 for a 645 series. He claimed the win by seven pins.

Nolan Hartl of Cannon Falls, Minnesota, posted the highest individual series in the Classified Division – 707 during his doubles set – to cruise to the victory in Classified All-Events with a 1,764 total.

The 707 series – featuring games of 191, 275 and 241 – was the only series north of 650 in Classified competition during the 2025 event, and he added 574 in singles and 483 in team to finish the tournament at the top of the leaderboard.

The big doubles set also allowed Hartl and Justin Dahlke of

Eagan, Minnesota, to tie for third place in the Standard Division with 1,244.

PARTICIPATION MILESTONES

In addition to the big scores in Baton Rouge, the 2025 Open Championships featured its fair share of participation highlights.

A total of 30 bowlers made their 50th appearance in 2025. The first two presentations took place during the same squad as brothers Randy and David Gulley joined the 50-Year Club together at the River Center. They became the first brothers to reach 50 years during the same tournament.

The final 50-year presentation of the year also had a cool tie to family. Randy Wiemer of Columbia, Missouri, joined his brother (Steve Wiemer) and father (Roger Wiemer) with 50 years at the Open Championships. Steve made his 52nd appearance in 2025 while Roger logged 51 appearances from 1949-2010.

USBC Hall of Famer Jamie Brooks of Fairview, Texas, made his 65th tournament appearance, becoming the 17th bowler to reach the number. Clinton Zavakos of Henderson, Nevada, celebrated his 70th consecutive appearance in 2025 to become just the fifth competitor to reach the participation mark.

HONOR SCORES

The 2025 Open Championships featured 18 perfect games and five 800s – all taking place on the doubles and singles oil pattern.

For 300s, the mix was six in doubles and 12 in singles. All five 800s occurred in doubles.

Two-time Eagle winner Jeffrey Mersch of Orlando, Florida, posted the highest individual series in 2025, recording games of 289, 258 and 279 for an 826 series. Team USA's AJ Johnson of Kenosha, Wisconsin, wasn't far behind with 823.

Jeremy Adler of Columbus, Indiana, connected for 813 while Gregory Thompson Jr. of Gilbert, Arizona, had a 300 during his set to finish with 810. Dave Dentlinger of Carroll, Iowa, finished with exactly 800 to register his honor score in Baton Rouge.

LEGENDARY IN LAS VEGAS

The 2025 United States Bowling Congress Women's Championships featured 4,099 teams at the South Point Bowling Plaza and recognized a Team All-Events champion for the first time during the tournament's 105th edition. Here are the top performances and major moments.

DOUBLING DOWN AT SOUTH POINT

Winning at the USBC Women's Championships was twice as nice for five competitors in 2025 as the members of Sterner Strong 1 – Valerie Bercier, Kristin McEntee, Michelle Sterner and Terysa Wojnar – and Chicago's Rebecca Gierut were able to claim a pair of wins in Las Vegas.

Sterner Strong 1 earned the Diamond Team title and became the first group to win Team All-Events after two strong days at the Bowling Plaza. In Diamond Team, the talented crew rolled games of 931, 939 and 893 to post the top score with 2,763. McEntee led the way with a 745 series and was followed by Wojnar (703), Sterner (665) and Bercier (650).

Just about every pin played a pivotal role as the group recorded the top number in Team All-Events with 8,185 (a 227.3 team average). Sterner Strong 1 finished 10 pins ahead of second place and 16 pins in front of third in the 27-game marathon.

Bercier paced Sterner Strong 1 with a 2,106 score for all-events. Wojnar checked in at 2,105, McEntee had 2,052 and Sterner posted 1,922.

The wins helped add to the group's impressive collection of titles at the Women's Championships. Sterner now is a six-time champion, while McEntee and Wojnar moved up to four and three wins, respectively. Bercier secured her first two wins at the event.

Gierut earned her victories in Sapphire Singles and Sapphire All-Events at the 2025 event.

Competing during the final week, her impressive showing in singles included games of 173, 212 and 202 for a winning score of 587. That performance helped propel her nine-game score to the top of the leaderboard, too. With sets of 510 in team and 476 in doubles, she finished with an all-events tally of 1,573 to lead the way.

MCCARTHY ROLLS 300 AND 800 FOR SINGLES WIN

While the 2025 Women's Championships featured its fair share of honor scores, Erin McCarthy of Elkhorn, Nebraska, connected for a pair of them to win Diamond Singles.

The 2022 U.S. Women's Open champion started her singles set with a perfect game. She followed with 243 and 257 to reach 800 and collect her first title at the event.

Heading into her final frame of singles, McCarthy needed good

count on her first shot to take the lead, but a strike was necessary for a chance at 800. She delivered the strike and followed with a nine count and spare to lock up the 800 series.

KULICK CLAIMS SECOND ALL-EVENTS TITLE

USBC Hall of Famer Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey, averaged more than 251 at the 2025 Women's Championships to record her second win in Diamond All-Events.

She posted scores of 792 in doubles, 765 in singles and 704 in team for a nine-game total of 2,261. During doubles, Kulick also recorded the first 300 game of the 2025 event.

Her final score is fourth on the tournament's all-time list and marked her second time surpassing 2,200 at the Women's Championships. She finished with 2,211 to win Diamond All-Events at the 2019 event in Wichita, Kansas.

COLLEGIATE TEAMMATES WIN DOUBLES

Maria Bulanova of Rockvale, Tennessee, and Adel Wahner of Verona, Wisconsin, spent their collegiate days representing Vanderbilt University and helped the Commodores win the 2018 NCAA Bowling Championship.

Reunited in Las Vegas for the 2025 Women's Championships, the pair channeled those winning ways once again in Diamond Doubles and recorded the victory with a 1,500 total. Their winning tally is second on the tournament's all-time list.

Wahner led the way at South Point, posting three games of 258 for a 774 series. Bulanova added 223, 233 and 270 for a 726 series to help the pair claim their first wins at the Women's Championships.

BIG NUMBERS IN SIN CITY

The 2025 tournament featured nine 300s, four 800s and several amazing achievements worthy of the record book.

Kayla Pashina of Otsego, Minnesota, now holds the record for the highest series in tournament history after firing games of 300, 257 and 279 for an 836 series during her doubles set in 2025.

She had 18 consecutive strikes to start her record-breaking series and finished with strikes on 32 of her 36 deliveries. Pashina also has a 299 at the Women's Championships, achieved during doubles at the 2024 event in Reno, Nevada.

Pashina and McCarthy were joined by 2025 USBC Queens champion Josie Barnes of Hermitage, Tennessee (805 in team), and Darian Miller of Slidell, Louisiana (812 in doubles), with 800s at South Point.

Najah Owens of Raleigh, North Carolina, earned her spot in tournament history by becoming the first competitor to record two



300s during the same appearance at the Women's Championships.

Owens posted her first 300 during her team event, finishing with a 782 series. She matched the feat the next day during singles for a 765 series. She added 696 in doubles to finish second in Diamond All-Events with 2,243.

The performance also helped Owens join a pair of USBC Hall of Famers – Jeanne Naccarato of Tacoma, Washington, and Jodi Woessner of Oregon, Ohio – with multiple 300s at the tournament. Naccarato rolled her 300s during the 2014 and 2019 events, while Woessner recorded her second 300 at the Women's Championships in 2025 (first occurred in 2023).

RAISING TROPHIES IN RUBY

Teryl Gade of Littleton, Colorado, and Tammy Bellofatto of Lakewood, Colorado, took over the top spot in Ruby Doubles on the third day of the 2025 Women's Championships. That can make for a long wait, but it ended up being a statement win for the pair.

They claimed the victory in Ruby Doubles by more than 100 pins, finishing with a combined score of 1,354 at the Bowling Plaza. Bellofatto had games of 226, 256 and 209 to lead the performance with a 691 series, and Gade added 199, 280 and 184 for 663.

The members of Paper Chasers 16 of Temple Hills, Maryland, saw everyone chasing their score in Ruby Team, recording the win with a 2,349 total in Las Vegas. The group put together games of 714, 873 and 762.

Logan Brown rolled a 726 series to lead the team, and she was joined by Angela Brown (593), Makeba Coleman (537) and Allison Coleman (493).

A strong start in the team event helped Ladine Jones of Anaheim, California, take home the gemstone trophy for Ruby All-Events with a nine-game score of 1,933.

Jones had 716 during her team event and closed with 659 in doubles and 558 in singles.

In Ruby Singles, the top score belonged to Kaitlyn George of Arlington, Texas, with 702.

George had games of 220, 245 and 237 to earn the win, and she needed a big finish in Game 3 to get the job done. After an open in the fourth frame, she responded with five consecutive strikes. George needed to start her final frame with a strike to take the outright lead, and she was able to deliver to make it six in a row. She closed with a nine count and spare to secure the title.

EMERGING VICTORIOUS IN EMERALD

Christen Riggins of Upper Marlboro, Maryland, cruised to an impressive win in Emerald All-Events during the 2025 Women's Championships, taking the top spot by more than 80 pins with a total score of 1,834.

She put together sets of 644 in doubles, 637 in singles and 553 in team to take care of business at South Point. Riggins' 637 also helped her collect a runner-up finish in Emerald Singles.

The top spot in Emerald Singles belonged to Anna Marie Grenville of Melbourne, Florida, in 2025 with 643.

Grenville earned the victory with games of 224, 210 and 209 in Las Vegas.

In Emerald Team, the members of Spare Me of Bellevue, Washington, improved each game on the way to a winning score of 2,184. The team had games of 671, 734 and 779.

Julie Sieger struck plenty for Spare Me to pace the group, finishing with a 704 series. She was joined at South Point by Heidi Anderson (581), Kim Mellick (486) and Jackie Johnson (413).

Brandy Burkhart of Reno, Nevada, and Desiree Hurd of Fernley, Nevada, recorded the victory in Emerald Doubles in 2025 with a combined score of 1,154.

Burkhart had games of 211, 192 and 237 to lead the way with a 640 series. Hurd added games of 192, 178 and 144 at South Point for 514.

STRIKING WINS IN SAPPHIRE

Along with Rebecca Gierut's wins in Sapphire Singles and All-Events, big-time performances helped the top spot in Sapphire Doubles stay local in and sent the Sapphire Team title to Michigan in 2025.

Las Vegas' Mary Odom and Glencora Lannen kept the gemstone trophies for Sapphire Doubles in Clark County and claimed the win with a combined score of 982.

Lannen led the way with games of 189, 157 and 163 for a 509 series, and Odom added 141, 192 and 140 for a 473 series in the winning performance.

In Sapphire Team, the members of Misfits of Stevensville, Michigan, steadily improved each game at South Point to secure the victory with a total of 1,818. The team posted games of 541, 619 and 658.

Estela Mangulabnan fired a 637 series to lead the team, and she was joined in Las Vegas by Annette Garrison (416), Olivia Garrison (392) and Denise Barton (373).

MAJOR MILESTONES

Celebrating longevity is one of the best parts of the Women's Championships, and in 2025, three bowlers joined the tournament's 50-Year Club.

Joyce Dixon of Mesa, Arizona; Theresa Fellows of Bozeman, Montana, and Marilyn Smith of Prairieville, Louisiana, each celebrated their 50th consecutive appearance at the South Point Bowling Plaza and received a plaque, chevron and commemorative necklace to highlight the milestone.

Onalee Kraus of Coldwater, Michigan, made her 63rd appearance at the Women's Championships in 2025, which places her second on the all-time participation list.

FUN AT THE FORTY FRAME GAME

Along with the excitement of the Women's Championships at



South Point, competitors were able to take part in the return of The Forty Frame Game in 2025 as more than 960 entries came in for the world's most unique singles tournament.

The Forty Frame Game blends creative scoring – through no-tap frames, mulligans, bonus pins and other fun challenges – over 40 continuous frames and features three optional side events to go along with the Main Event – Gray Pay, 175 and Under and Scratch.

Phoenix's Barbara Wilson finished with the top score in the Main Event in 2025, posting a final tally of 1,106. That number also helped her earn the win in Gray Pay.

Gia Roe of Aurora, Colorado, led the way in 175 and Under with 1,016. Las Vegas' Raycine Mortensen finished with the top score in Scratch with 1,072.

Going into a fight, everyone has a plan . . . until they get punched in the face.

Gary Haines of Babylon, New York, had a plan going into the stepladder finals at the 2025 United States Bowling Congress Masters, which was being contested in the famed Strobl Arena inside Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Michigan, and broadcast live on FOX.

Since, as the tournament's No. 1 seed and lone undefeated bowler, he would have to be beaten twice in order to be denied the title, Haines planned to use Game 1 to get comfortable so that he could be at his best during Game 2.

Although that plan was great in theory, the 36-year-old left-hander had a tough time putting it into practice; nevertheless, he rolled with the punches, countered as best he could and delivered his best shots of the day when he needed them most to defeat Anthony Simonsen of Las Vegas, 192-186, during the second game of the championship match to win the 2025 USBC Masters title.

In addition to the \$100,000 first-place prize, Haines also collected his first Professional Bowlers Association Tour title and major championship.

Simonsen, who was thwarted in his bid to join Australia's Jason Belmonte as just the second player in history to win four Masters titles, took home \$50,000 for the runner-up finish.

Although Haines conceded that the capacity crowd inside Strobl Arena and the thousands watching at home on national TV didn't get to see him at his best, he was still proud of the effort he put forth to reach the winner's circle.

That effort included a no-doubt strike in the ninth frame and a high-flush 10 pin on the first ball in the 10th.

From a scoring standpoint, the strike in the ninth was very meaningful as it gave Haines a double heading into the 10th frame. That meant that as long as he could pick up a mark and four pins in the last frame, he'd win the match and title.

But that ninth-frame strike will be remembered for something far bigger than its impact on the final score.

Right before Haines stepped up to bowl that frame, he called a time out, walked toward the back of the settee area and leaned over to kiss his wife, who was sitting in the front row alongside other members of their family.

Seemingly rejuvenated after the brief exchange of affection, Haines stepped up and delivered what was probably his best shot of the day.

Another thing that will endure for the rest of his life is Haines' status as a Masters champion. After several near misses at various tournaments throughout his bowling career, Haines was ecstatic to have notched his breakthrough victory at such a prestigious event.

Haines still plans to bowl plenty of the small stuff as, despite Sunday's Masters victory, he doesn't have any immediate plans to take a run at bowling full time on the PBA Tour.

Simonsen definitely got the better of Haines for at least the first 10 frames.

Simonsen used an opening turkey and seven strikes in total to top Haines by a score of 207-172 during the opening game of the championship match.

One game earlier, Simonsen took advantage of two late opens to get past this year's Masters qualifying leader, Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, by a score of 189-176.

O'Neill started Sunday's telecast by besting Justin Knowles of Okemos, Michigan, 202-195.

For their third- and fourth-place finishes, O'Neill and Knowles took home \$25,000 and \$15,000, respectively.

The duo advanced to the stepladder after surviving the previous day's Elimination Bracket Finals, which was broadcast live on FS1.

The 2025 Masters began on March 24 with a sold-out field of 390 bowlers and was contested on a 44-foot lane pattern designed specifically for the event. All qualifying and match-play rounds leading up to the two telecasts were broadcast live on BowlTV.

Josie Barnes of Hermitage, Tennessee, won the 2025 United States Bowling Congress Queens over Malaysia's Sin Li Jane, 211-198, at Suncoast Hotel & Casino in Las Vegas.

Barnes knew she had her work cut out for her in the title match against 2024 Professional Women's Bowling Association Player of the Year Sin, who was coming off two wins in the stepladder finals in search of her first tiara. A win for Sin meant she would achieve the Triple Crown of major titles (Queens, U.S. Women's Open and PWBA Tour Championship).

The title match began as disastrously as it could for Sin, opening three times in the first six frames and starting over 50 pins behind Barnes, who stayed clean and threw a turkey in frames two through five.

Sin found new life after an open by Barnes in the seventh before throwing two strikes to begin her comeback attempt. That attempt was essentially over before the 10th frame as Barnes doubled in frames eight and nine, needing only nine pins in the final frame to win, even as Sin didn't miss to close out the match with 198.

A 10 pin, spare for Barnes sealed the deal, closing with a strike in the fill ball for 211 to earn her first Queens title, second major title and fifth overall title to become PWBA Hall of Fame eligible when she turns 50 years old. Sin earned \$30,000 for her runner-up finish.

For Barnes, her confidence, not only this week but throughout the course of a PWBA Tour season, has only grown as she gets older and juggles many things in life, even if things don't go how they plan.

As Barnes grinded through the Winners Bracket in match play, she kept herself focused on what was in front of her, knowing each win meant a better end result.

That paid off for Barnes, who won the title, the tiara and the \$60,000 top prize in Las Vegas with her sister, Jessica Earnest, in attendance to see Josie win the major.

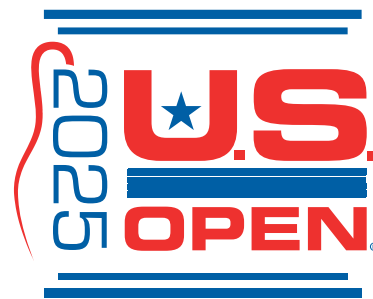
The stepladder finals started with a close match between Valerie Bercier of Muskegon, Michigan, and Colombia's Clara Guerrero. Bercier started with the first five strikes to pull ahead, but an open let Guerrero take the lead and seal the match with a strike in the first ball of the 10th for 237. Bercier ended with 233 and \$12,500 for fifth place.

Guerrero advanced to face Sin in what turned out to be the closest match of the evening. Despite an open to start the match for Sin, she clawed her way back and struck out the final five shots for 238 to Guerrero's 236. Guerrero earned \$17,500 for her fourth-place finish.

The semifinal match pitted Sin against fellow Malaysian teammate Nur Hazirah Ramli, who was making her debut in any professional event this week. Two opens by Sin in the first four frames put Ramli ahead, but once again, Sin never wavered. Sin threw the final seven strikes for 235 and Ramli was unable to match that, bowing out with 211 and \$22,500 for third place.

All rounds of qualifying and match play leading up to the stepladder finals were aired live on BowlTV and the stepladder finals was televised live on CBS Sports Network.

The 2025 Queens started with 198 competitors. After 15 games of qualifying over three days, the top 63 players and Jillian Martin, who was guaranteed a spot in the bracket as the defending champion, advanced to match play.

In 2023, EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, dominated the field at Royal Pin Woodland in Indianapolis, leading qualifying, earning the top seed for the stepladder finals and topping Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, North Carolina, 221-208, during the title match to win his first U.S. Open title.

The 2025 tournament may not have gone as smoothly, but the end result was the same as Tackett defeated No. 1 seed Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, by a score of 238-184 during the live stepladder finals on FOX to win the 2025 U.S. Open presented by Go Bowling – also contested at Royal Pin Woodland – and become just the 13th player in history to record multiple U.S. Open victories.

For his efforts, Tackett, 32-year-old right-hander, was rewarded with his second green jacket, the iconic eagle trophy and the U.S. Open's \$100,000 first-place prize.

Anderson, who led this year's tournament nearly wire to wire prior to the stepladder finals, took home \$50,000 for finishing second.

The title match appeared to be trending in Anderson's favor early on as the 29-year-old right-hander started with strikes in three of his first four frames while Tackett managed just one strike and three spares during that same stretch.

The 2023 U.S. Open champion would turn up the heat from there, however, rattling off a four-bagger in frames five through eight.

Anderson, meanwhile, left the 1-5-7-8 in the fifth frame and the 3-4-6-7 split in the eighth, both of which resulted in open frames.

The top seed never gave in, but the deficit was simply too big to overcome, and when Tackett ran his string of strikes to five by getting all 10 pins to fall in the ninth frame, the match was over, and Tackett had officially become a two-time U.S. Open champion.

At the end of the second round of qualifying, it seemed unlikely that he would even make the cut to match play as he was 185 pins behind the cut line in 78th place.

However, he averaged just under 234 during his final eight-game qualifying block to make the cut in 22nd place – 24 players advanced.

He continued the dominant run during the three rounds of match play that followed as he authored a field-best 18-6 record and averaged just under 233 over the course of those 24 games to climb all the way up to the No. 2 spot in the standings.

The only person Tackett was unable to chase down prior to the stepladder finals was Anderson.

Still, even Tackett had to concede that a comeback performance of that magnitude would have been unlikely in years past.

Tackett came to the 2023 U.S. Open with some people still questioning whether or not he could get the job done on bowling's biggest stages.

Since that time, he's collected two U.S. Open titles, four total majors and two PBA Player of the Year awards, all of which renders that question asked and answered.

In addition to increased confidence, Tackett also credits his recent success to only focusing on the things he can control.

Tackett certainly performed well during his two TV matches.

One match prior to taking down Anderson for the title, Tackett looked poised to flirt with perfection as he started with seven strikes in a row during his semifinal match against No. 3 seed Chris Via of Blacklick, Ohio, the 2021 U.S. Open champion.

Tackett's run at 300 ended abruptly when he left a pocket 7-10 split in the eighth frame; however, it did nothing to put the outcome of the match in jeopardy as Tackett already held a sizable lead and would cruise to a 245-152 victory.

Via earned \$25,000 for his third-place finish.

One match earlier, Via topped 2016 and 2019 U.S. Open champ Francois Lavoie of Wichita, Kansas, by a score of 238-226 to earn his shot at Tackett.

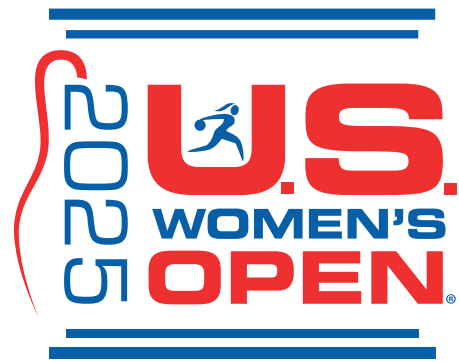
Lavoie kicked off the stepladder by using a late six-bagger to defeat 2022 U.S. Open winner Anthony Simonsen of Las Vegas, 246-206.

Lavoie finished in fourth place and earned \$16,000 while Simonsen took home \$10,000 for finishing fifth.

Action at the 2025 U.S. Open kicked off on Sunday, Jan. 26, when more than 100 bowlers competed in an eight-game pre-tournament qualifier to earn the final spots in this year's U.S. Open field of 108 bowlers. Three eight-game qualifying rounds and 24 games of head-to-head match play followed. After the completion of the final eight-game round of match play, the top nine bowlers advanced to this year's two U.S. Open stepladder finals broadcasts.

The first show featured seeds No. 5-9 battling it out on FS1 and saw Simonsen defeat Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Florida, by a score of 233-211 to earn the No. 5 seed for final stepladder telecast.

The 2025 U.S. Open was a collaborative effort between the United States Bowling Congress and Bowling Proprietors' Association of America and was considered a major on the PBA Tour. The total prize fund for the event exceeded \$275,000.

Singapore's New Hui Fen won four straight stepladder matches to win the 2025 U.S. Women's Open for her second career major and fifth overall Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour title, clinching the victory with a 290 in the title match against Jordan Snodgrass of Adrian, Michigan, at Sun Valley Lanes in Lincoln, Nebraska.

New had a four-game stepladder total of 1,026 on the live CBS Sports Network telecast, setting the record for most pins knocked down in a stepladder final since the relaunch of the PWBA Tour in 2015 on her way to the green jacket, eagle trophy and \$60,000 top prize. The Singaporean right-hander looked comfortable from the start of her run on the demanding 41-foot oil condition.

New's record-breaking run began with an opening-match bout against Maryssa Carey of Hobart, Indiana, who was making her debut stepladder appearance.

An opening start of five strikes in a row for New put her in front early with Carey trying to keep up. Two opens later in the match for Carey ended her run with a 189 game while New never let up and advanced with 246. Carey earned \$13,000 for her fifth-place finish.

Next for New was 2024 PWBA Rookie of the Year, Crystal Elliott of Palm Bay, Florida, making her first major stepladder finals and second stepladder of the 2025 season. The left lane began to breakdown during the match, and it was evident with Elliott unable to make contact with the pocket and New making a ball change to something

that was cleaner early on.

The change proved to be the right move for New, who missed pocket just once and finished with 228 to Elliott's 183. Elliott earned \$17,000 for her fourth-place finish while New continued to the semifinal match.

New's opponent was Lauren Russo of O'Fallon, Missouri, seeking her second career title after winning the 2024 PWBA Southern Indiana Open in a high-scoring affair against Snodgrass.

Things would not play out similarly for Russo, opening three times in the first six frames as New opened with yet another string of strikes. Back-to-back spares for New weren't enough for Russo to make a comeback, bowing out with a 174 to New's 262. Russo took home \$22,000 for third place.

The title match between New and Snodgrass would push the winner to the forefront of the PWBA Player of the Year award. Snodgrass led the points race after three straight championship-round appearances and a win at the PWBA Bowlers Journal Waterloo Open, despite New's two wins during the PWBA Summer Series in Cleveland.

After a high-flush 4 pin for New, she never missed again, ending 11 strikes in a row for 290, too much for Snodgrass to overcome as she settled for a runner-up finish, earning \$30,000. It was New's third win of the year and the 1,026 four-game total beat out Bryanna Coté's 1,022 from the 2022 BVL Classic, while also putting her in the lead for PWBA Player of the Year.

New knows there is still a lot of bowling left for the season, however.

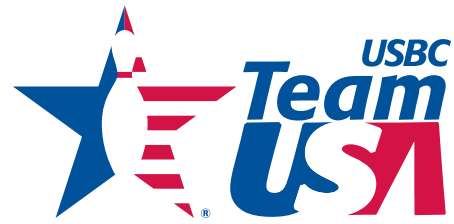
All 108 competitors at the 2025 U.S. Women's Open bowled 24 qualifying games over three days to determine the 36 players advancing to Round 4. After eight additional games, the field was cut to the top 24 bowlers for round-robin match play.

The five finalists were determined by total pinfall, including bonus pins, for 56 games.

The 2025 U.S. Women's Open was live streamed on BowlTV for all rounds of competition prior to the live stepladder finals.

Chris Via of Blacklick, Ohio; Matt Russo of Ballwin, Missouri; and Kristopher Prather of Romeoville, Illinois, donned the red, white and blue for the Team USA men.

The Americans left Hong Kong with three medals as Pluhowsky, Martin, Lauren Russo and Coté combined to win Women's Team gold while Hanrahan, Via, Matt Russo and Prather earned Men's Team bronze. Hanrahan also took home bronze in Men's Singles.

After the final shots had been thrown at the IBF World Cup, it was time for members of Para Team USA to bowl for score as the 2025 IBF Para Bowling World Championships followed in Hong Kong from Jan. 16-24.

David Nelson, Jr. of Gretna, Nebraska; Eddy Hutchens of Franktown, Colorado; Gina Jenkins of Bedford, Texas; George Holscher of Chesapeake, Virginia; Debra Freed of Framingham, Massachusetts; and Emma "Toodie" Perry of Bakersfield, California, were the athletes selected to represent Para Team USA on the international stage, and the sextet did its country proud, combining to win six medals – two gold, two silver, two bronze – during the nine-day event in Hong Kong.

The gold medals came during doubles competition as Holscher and Nelson teamed up to win Men's Doubles while Freed and Jenkins worked together to secure first place in Women's Doubles.

Holscher would also pick up silver medals in Men's Singles and Men's All-Events with Nelson finishing just behind, placing third and earning bronze in both competitions.

After nearly a month of action in Hong Kong in January, Team USA bowlers wouldn't get back on the lanes until mid-June when competition got underway at the 2025 IBF Youth World Cup, which was contested at Olympia Bowling in Helsingborg, Sweden, from June 15-22.

One male and one female were allowed to represent their countries in Europe, and it was Connor Fleming of Fort Worth, Texas, and Abigania who made the trip for Junior Team USA.

Both athletes gave it everything they had during their five days of action on the lanes in Sweden; nevertheless, neither was able to bring home a medal as Abigania placed 10th in the 31-player women's division, and Fleming landed in 23rd out of 37 men's competitors.

The American medal count was considerably higher at the 2025 PANAM Bowling Youth Championships, which were held in Guatemala City, Guatemala, from Aug. 9-17.

Erin Klemencic of Powder Springs, Georgia; Annalise O'Bryant of Ball Ground, Georgia; Gianna Brandolino of Channahon, Illinois; and Martin competed in the women's division for Junior Team USA while Josh Hammons of Topeka, Kansas; Ernesto Reynoso of Folsom, California; Brandon Bohn of Jackson, New Jersey; and Landin Jordan of Sycamore, Illinois, did battle for the men.

Bohn and Hammons led the American charge, coming home with five medals apiece with Bohn earning four gold (Men's Singles, Men's Doubles, Men's Trios, Men's All-Events) and one bronze (Men's Team) while

All United States Bowling Congress members have the opportunity to represent their country in international competition as members of Team USA or Junior Team USA.

As has become tradition, the year kicked off with the 2025 USBC Team USA Trials and U.S. National Amateur Bowling Championships at the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nevada. The events concluded with the introduction of Team USA and Junior Team for 2025. The Junior Team USA rosters also included those who qualified for the team through the Junior Gold Championships and the U22 Masters and U22 Queens.

Crystal Elliott of Palm Bay, Florida, and Ryan Barnes of Denton, Texas, claimed spots by winning their respective divisions during Team USA Trials competition, which consisted of 30 games bowled over the course of five days across five challenging oil patterns.

Elliott, who became the first athlete to win Team USA Trials the year after winning the U.S. Amateur title, averaged 223.13 per game for the week and finished in the top 20 in the 99-player women's field during all five qualifying rounds.

Barnes averaged 229.6 and collected three top-10 daily finishes, including first place on Day 5, en route to topping the 182-player men's field.

Katelyn Abigania of San Diego and C.J. Petrin of Edmond, Oklahoma, also earned titles as they left Reno with the 2025 National Amateur Bowling Championships crowns.

With the rosters for Team USA and Junior Team USA finalized for 2025, it was time for the program's talented bowlers to get down to business and hit the lanes for some competition.

The first event on the calendar was the 2025 International Bowling Federation World Cup, which took place in Hong Kong from Jan. 5-14.

Shannon Pluhowsky of Dayton, Ohio; Jillian Martin of Stow, Ohio; Lauren Russo of Ballwin, Missouri; and Bryanna Coté of Marana, Arizona, comprised the women's squad while Packy Hanrahan of Wichita, Kansas;



Hammons bagged two gold (Men's Doubles, Men's Trios), one silver (Men's All-Events) and two bronze (Men's Team, Men's Singles).

Reynoso and Martin were next in line with three medals each with Reynoso securing one gold (Men's Trios), one silver (Men's Doubles) and one bronze (Men's Team) and Martin picking up one gold (Women's Doubles with Brandolino) and two silver (Women's Team, Women's All-Events).

Jordan, Brandolino, Klemencic and OBryant got in on the action as well, earning two medals apiece during their time in Guatemala.

With consecutive youth events in the books, it was then time for the members of Senior Team USA to defend their home turf during action at the 2025 IBF World Seniors Championships, which was contested at the National Bowling Stadium from Oct. 17-23.

Eight talented seniors represented the red, white and blue with John Janawicz of Winter Haven, Florida; Chris Barnes of Denton, Texas; Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey, and Tom Hess of Granger, Iowa, making up the men's squad and Jodi Woessner of Oregon, Ohio; Lynda Barnes of Denton, Texas; Rina Sabo of Bennett, Colorado, and Dana Ausec of Colorado Springs, Colorado, bowling for the Senior Team USA women.

Janawicz and Hess were the most frequent American visitors to the podium in Reno as Janawicz collected four gold medals (Men's Team, Men's Singles, Men's All-Events, Men's Masters) and one bronze (Men's Doubles) while Hess earned one gold (Men's Team), one silver (Men's All-Events) and two bronze (Men's Singles, Men's Doubles).

Chris Barnes (one gold, one silver, one bronze), Lynda Barnes (one gold, two silver) and Woessner (two gold, one bronze) brought home three medals each while Bohn (one gold, one bronze), Sabo (two gold) and Ausec (one gold, one silver) each walked away with two.

The pace slowed just a bit during Team USA's final international event of the year, the 2025 IBF World Championships, which took place in Hong Kong from Nov. 25 – Dec. 5.

Twelve American athletes competed at the event with Coté, Russo, Martin, Breanna Clemmer of Pikeville, Kentucky, Shannon Pluhowsky of Dayton, Ohio, and Julia Bond of Lincoln, Nebraska, comprising the women's team and Andrew Anderson of Chesterfield Township, Michigan; Ryan Barnes, Hanrahan, A.J. Johnson of Kenosha, Wisconsin; Prather and Via going to work for the men.

Bond, Clemmer and Martin each took home one gold medal and one bronze while Pluhowsky walked away with one gold and one silver. Coté and Russo earned one gold medal apiece (Women's Team).

Ryan Barnes was the lone medalist for the Team USA men in Hong Kong as he finished third and took bronze in Men's Singles.

That allowed the Americans to finish with 40 international medals on the year, 15 gold, 12 silver and 13 bronze.

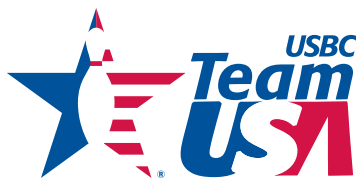

Over the years, many incredible champions have been crowned at the famed Strobl Arena, which is located inside Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Michigan.

Brandon Bohn of Jackson, New Jersey, and Aleesha Oden of Council Bluffs, Iowa, added their names to the list of remarkable athletes who have won titles at the hallowed venue with Bohn taking home the crown at the 2025 United States Bowling Congress U22 Masters and Oden emerging victorious at the U22 Queens.

Technically, Bohn's name was already on the list because he won the inaugural U22 Masters, which was contested inside Strobl Arena on Memorial Day in 2024.

Nevertheless, the 20-year-old three-time Junior Gold champion put an exclamation point beside it on Monday by defeating No. 1 seed Nicholas Sternes of Buffalo Grove, Illinois, by scores of 182-154 and 266-257 to complete a successful title defense and remain the only champion in U22 Masters history.

Bohn was forced to defeat Sternes twice because, as the No. 1 seed, Sternes entered the stepladder as the tournament's lone undefeated bowler.

Sternes earned that distinction by winning a pair of matches during the final rounds of bracket match play at Thunderbowl Lanes.

The 22-year-old right-hander started his day with a 388-361 win

over Bohn, and then he topped Dmitri Richardson of Wichita, Kansas, 377-318, during the battle to determine the top seed for the U22 Masters stepladder finals.

All bracket matches were two games with total pinfall determining the winner.

But even though Sternes got the better of Bohn during bracket play, it was Bohn who appeared most comfortable on the championship pair during the livestreamed BowlTV finals.

Bohn breezed to victory in the first game, shaking off a first-frame open by striking on four of his next seven shots.

Sternes, on the other hand, only recorded one strike total during the opening game, which allowed Bohn to cruise to a 28-pin victory, 182-154, that wasn't really as close as the final score might imply.

Bohn looked even stronger at the start of the deciding game, starting with a spare and then running off an eight-bagger in frames two through nine.

Sternes' struggle to record strikes carried over from Game 1 into the early stages of Game 2 as the finesse player, who bowled collegiately for Saint Xavier University during the 2024-2025 season, began the second game with four consecutive spares.

He notched his first strike of the game, and just his second of the match, during the fifth frame of Game 2; still, when that strike was put on the board, Sternes found himself trailing the defending champ by more than 30 pins with less than half a game to go.

But Sternes didn't stop with his strike in the fifth. He struck in the sixth frame as well and then again in the seventh. He put up another pair of strikes in the eighth and ninth frames before proceeding to strike out in the 10th.

It seemed inexplicable, but before anyone inside Strobl Arena could come to grips with what had happened, Sternes had finished with an eight-bagger of his own to post a final score of 257, which didn't just earn the crowd's respect; it forced Bohn to mark in the 10th frame to secure a victory that mere moments before had seemed all but certain.

That mark didn't come easily as Bohn's first shot in the final frame went high on the head pin, leaving a tricky three-pin combination in the form of the 2-4-7.

Nevertheless, Bohn, who often preaches the importance of making spares, was up to the task as he converted the leave and then fired a straight ball up the middle of the lane to secure the final pins needed to emerge with a hard-fought 266-257 victory.

In addition to his second consecutive U22 Masters title, Bohn collected a first-place check worth \$3,000. Sternes earned \$2,200 for his runner-up finish.

Richardson didn't just fight Bohn, he had the defending champion on the ropes, leading by 10 pins heading into the final three frames of



the semifinal match.

Everything changed in the eighth frame, however, as Richardson left the 3-6-7-10 split, which he was unable to convert. Bohn then stepped up and delivered strikes in the eighth, ninth and first two balls in the 10th to complete the comeback and walk away with a 241-220 victory.

That result earned Richardson a third-place finish and a check for \$1,800.

Just about an hour before Bohn collected his second U22 Masters title, Oden's hard work led to her first U22 Queens crown.

Oden, a 20-year-old left-hander who bowls collegiately for powerhouse Wichita State, earned the trophy and the tournament's \$3,000 first-place prize thanks to a 221-158 victory over Maia Struble of Anchorage, Alaska.

As the U22 Queens' lone undefeated bowler at 5-0, Oden only had to win one match during the stepladder finals in order to take home the title.

Oden secured the top seed for the stepladder by defeating Morgan Brunner of Gobles, Michigan (401-330), and Junior Team USA's Karina Capron of Fremont, Nebraska (396-362), during the final two rounds of bracket match play at Thunderbowl Lanes.

Any notion that Oden's pace might slow down once competition transitioned to the Strobl Arena was quickly laid to rest when the powerful lefty began the title match with a four-bagger to immediately jump ahead of No. 3 seed Struble.

A stubborn 7-pin in the fifth frame ended Oden's bid for perfection, but, after covering the spare, she rebounded with a double in the sixth and seventh frames.

Struble, meanwhile, managed just one strike during the first seven frames. Her difficulties getting all ten pins to fall down, coupled with open frames in the third and seventh frames, allowed Oden to establish a 65-pin lead with just three frames to go.

Oden experienced a slight hiccup by failing to convert the 3-5-6-9 in the ninth frame, but it wasn't enough to change the outcome as she rolled to a 63-pin victory and the 2025 U22 Queens title.

Struble settled for second place and took home \$2,200.

Another thing Oden showed yet again this week is that she is capable of going up against and beating some of the best young bowlers in the country, which only served to make the victory feel even better.

Before Oden took down Struble for the title, Struble opened the U22 Queens stepladder by defeating Capron, 178-155. The third-place finish netted Capron a check for \$1,800.

Nevertheless, Oden and Bohn weren't the only winners at the 2025 U22 Masters and U22 Queens. In addition to the two titles, eight spots on Junior Team USA 2026 were awarded this week in Allen Park as well.

Those spots were earmarked for the top three age-eligible finishers after qualifying and to each tournament's champion; however, since both of this year's champions will turn 21 before Jan. 1, 2026, their bids went to the fourth age-eligible qualifying finishers in each field.

As such, the spots available at the U22 Masters went to Nate

Trentler of Phoenix, Maryland, Josh Hammons of Topeka, Kansas, Andru Blaney of Hughesville, Maryland, and Micah Voorhis of Cherry Hill, New Jersey.

The Junior Team USA berths up for grabs at the U22 Queens were earned by Sydney Bohn of Jackson, New Jersey, Erin Klemencic of Powder Springs, Georgia, Keira Magsam of Gretna, Nebraska, and Melia Mitskavich of DuBois, Pennsylvania.

The 2025 U22 Masters and U22 Queens kicked off at Thunderbowl Lanes with fields of 159 bowlers and 82 bowlers, respectively.

The U22 Masters was contested on a 44-foot oil pattern, and the U22 Queens utilized a 45-foot pattern. Both lane patterns were designed specifically for their respective events.

All rounds of competition at the U22 Masters and U22 Queens, including the stepladder finals, were streamed live exclusively on BowITV.

In late February 2025, Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Florida, became eligible to bowl events on the Professional Bowlers Association's PBA50 Tour, which is reserved for athletes age 50 and older.

Despite still actively competing on the PBA Tour, where he is a four-time titlist and major champion, Daugherty decided he'd begin bowling some PBA50 events as well, figuring that more opportunities to compete would mean more opportunities to win and bolster his resume for eventual consideration for the PBA and United States Bowling Congress Halls of Fame.

That decision certainly seems to have been a good one as the 50-year-old right-hander won the 2025 USBC Senior Masters at Sam's Town Bowling Center in Las Vegas to collect his first PBA50 win and major.

Daugherty achieved the feat thanks to a 233-185 win over USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey, who qualified second for the stepladder finals and earned his berth in the title match after defeating No. 4 seed Mika Koivuniemi of Traverse City, Michigan, 247-232 during the semifinal match.

Koivuniemi, who also is in both the USBC and PBA Halls of Fame, kicked off the stepladder finals with victories over 2025 USBC Super Senior Classic champion James Campbell of Loudon, Tennessee, 249-204, and No. 3 seed Anthony Franklin of Frisco, Texas, 268-249, before falling to Bohn in Match 3.

The win earned Daugherty the Senior Masters trophy and the event's \$20,000 first-place prize. It also put him into early consideration for PBA50 Player of the Year honors and moved him one step closer to the hall of fame.

Bohn's runner-up finish netted him \$12,000. Koivuniemi earned \$9,000 for finishing third while Franklin and Campbell took home

\$7,500 and \$6,000, respectively.

Daugherty didn't just win this year's Senior Masters, he dominated the event.

The powerful righty averaged just under 244 and authored the second-highest qualifying total in the 310-player field, finishing second only to Bohn, who placed first after breaking both the tournament's 10 and 15 game qualifying scoring records.

It was Daugherty who stood alone on top after the completion of match play, however, as he was the only athlete in the 64-player Senior Masters bracket to post a perfect 6-0 record.

The final victory during that stretch was a win over Bohn during the battle to determine the top seed for the stepladder finals. Because Daugherty came out on top, it meant that he'd have to be beaten twice in order to be denied the title.

Bohn, a 61-year-old left-hander, threw more strikes than just about everyone at Sam's Town from qualifying through the stepladder semifinal match, but that all changed during the title tilt with Daugherty when Bohn only managed to get all 10 pins to fall just four times.

Daugherty, on the other hand, struck eight times, including a five-bagger in frames three through seven that allowed him to have the match all but sewn up with three frames to go.

Despite coasting to the finish line, Daugherty had a bit of trouble at the start of the final match as his first shot was a Brooklyn strike and his second resulted in a pocket 7-10; nevertheless, Daugherty wasn't shaken.

The 2025 Senior Masters started with 310 athletes completing three five-game qualifying blocks to determine the top 64 players in the double-elimination bracket. All bracket matches leading up to the stepladder featured a three-game total-pinfall format.

All rounds of competition at the 2025 Senior Masters were streamed live on BowlTV.

United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer Liz Johnson of Niagara Falls, New York, defeated Rina Sabo of Bennett, Colorado, 243-185, to win the 2025 USBC Senior Queens title at Sam's Town Bowling Center in Las Vegas.

Johnson adds to her already extensive trophy case, winning the event in her Senior Queens debut and joins Sandra Postma and Anne Marie Duggan as the only bowlers to win USBC Queens and USBC Senior Queens titles.

Johnson went into the double-elimination match-play bracket as the No. 1 seed, going undefeated and qualifying as the top seed for the stepladder finals.

Johnson had to be beaten twice in the stepladder finals in order to lose the title, but she won the first match against No. 3 seed Sabo to take home the championship. Sabo was looking to follow in the footsteps of last year's champion, Kathy Ledford of Boise, Idaho, who was the No. 3 seed and took home the win in the 2024 event.

Ledford and Sabo faced off in the second match of the 2025 stepladder, with Ledford, the No. 5 seed, hoping to be the first back-to-back champion since Robin Romeo's three straight wins from 2014-2016.

Unfortunately, the magic ran out for Ledford, who managed just a 148 to Sabo's 247, guaranteeing a new champion would be crowned this year. Ledford earned \$4,000 for her fourth-place finish.

Sabo's opponent in the semifinals was Jody Scheerer of Orlando, Florida, who was also making her Senior Queens debut. Scheerer lost to Johnson in the match for the top seed, but was a consistent force all week as she qualified as the No. 2 seed in the bracket.

The semifinal match saw neither Sabo or Scheerer able to pull

away until the last few frames, where Sabo rolled the 2 pin forward in the eighth frame and tripped the 4 pin out in the ninth. Scheerer threw her own great shot that saw the 4 pin stand, before a pocket 7 pin in the ninth saw her hopes fade fast.

A wrap 10 pin to start the final frame put the nail in the coffin for Scheerer, ending with 188 while Sabo advanced to the title match with a 213. Scheerer earned \$5,000 for the third-place finish.

The title match was all Johnson, who threw seven strikes in the first eight frames while Sabo was unable to carry the corner pins and fell behind early. Johnson officially put her stamp on the event with all three strikes in the 10th frame for 243 against Sabo's 185. Sabo earned \$6,200 for her runner-up finish, improving upon the 2024 event where she finished in a tie for 13th place.

Johnson took home \$8,000, the trophy and the tiara for her winning efforts, starting off her senior career with a bang and in a place that holds many memories not just for her, but the other competitors in the field.

The stepladder finals began with Ledford and Canada's Jill Friis, where the low-scoring match went in favor of Ledford, 172-166. Friis earned \$3,050 for the fifth-place finish, the same place she ended the 2024 event.

The 2025 event started with three five-game qualifying rounds for the 92 competitors, with the top 31 bowlers after 15 games joining Ledford in the double-elimination match-play bracket.

BowlTV livestreamed the 2025 event from start to finish at Sam's Town, including the stepladder finals.

James Campbell of Loudon, Tennessee, won three matches in the stepladder finals to take home the title in the 2025 United States Bowling Congress Super Senior Classic at Sam's Town Bowling Center in Las Vegas.

Campbell, a 61-year-old right-hander, was seeded fourth for the stepladder and defeated No. 1 seed Pete Weber, 201-193, in the final match of the event featuring players 60 and older. His win over the USBC and Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer gave Campbell his first senior title and the first-place check worth \$8,000.

The title match was close through the first half of the match, with Weber holding a three-pin lead after five frames. With both players clean through six frames and Weber working on a double, the seventh frame would prove to be a momentum changer.

Campbell left the 3-6-7-10 split, but was able to convert it for a crucial spare. Weber left a 10 pin his seventh frame, and uncharacteristically missed it for an open frame.

Campbell threw strikes in his eighth and ninth frames and then sat as Weber got up to bowl his ninth and 10th frames needing three consecutive strikes and at least seven pins on his fill ball to seal the win. Weber struck in the ninth, but left the 4-10 split in the 10th, which he was unable to convert.

That left Campbell needing a mark in his 10th frame to claim the championship. He left the 10 pin on his first shot in the 10th and calmly converted it, then got nine on his final shot to wrap up the win.

Campbell's road to the title actually started prior to the stepladder finals as he had to survive the Group B stepladder finals earlier in the day. Campbell defeated Venezuela's Amleto Monacelli in the first match of the Group B stepladder, 214-197, then took out

Mexico's Carlos Denot, 222-180. That win made him the No. 4 seed for the main stepladder finals.

In Match 1 of the stepladder, against USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Parker Bohn III, Campbell finished with strikes on seven of his last eight shots for a 248-224 win. Bohn, who was after his first PBA60 win to go with his 35 PBA Tour titles and 11 PBA50 titles, was undone by open frames in the eighth and ninth frames when he was unable to convert the 4-6-10 split and a 3-5-9 leave respectively.

Bohn reached the main stepladder by winning the Group A stepladder with wins over Finland's Timo Raatikainen (230-209) and two-time Super Senior Classic winner Ron Mohr of Las Vegas (279-215).

After defeating Bohn, Campbell was nearly perfect in his semifinal match against No. 2 seed John Burkett. He started with the first nine strikes before leaving a 3 pin on his first shot in the 10th on his way to a 279-214 win.

Weber, 62, of St. Ann, Missouri, earned \$6,550 for second place. Burkett, 60, a former Major League Baseball All-Star pitcher and one-time champion on the PBA50 Tour from Fort Worth, Texas, collected \$5,250 for third and Bohn, 61, of Jackson, New Jersey, got \$4,000 for fourth.

Campbell also owns a USBC Eagle in Team All Events at the 2004 USBC Open Championships in Reno, Nevada, and is an assistant coach for the men's bowling team at Tennessee Wesleyan.

The 2025 Super Senior Classic, which was livestreamed from start to finish by BowlTV, featured the top players age 60 and older. The event started with 208 players bowling 12 games of qualifying to determine the top 52 competitors for the Cashers' Round.

The advancers bowled six more games, with 18-game totals determining the 12 players for match play.

The match-play finalists were placed into one of two match-play groups. Group A consisted of the qualifiers who placed as an odd seed after the cashers' round (1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11), while Group B featured the even seeds (2, 4, 6, 8, 10 and 12).

Each competitor in match play bowled six head-to-head games, including a final position round, and 24-game totals – including 30 bonus pins for each victory – determined the top two seeds for the main stepladder finals.

Weber earned the top seed in the main stepladder finals by winning Group B with a 5,712 total, while Burkett claimed the No. 2 seed by taking the top spot in Group A with 5,627.

The second-, third- and fourth-place finisher in each match-play group still were in contention to advance to the main stepladder through a group stepladder that took place just prior to the main stepladder at Sam's Town.

After three days of competition at Cityview Lanes in Fort Worth, Texas, 12 winners emerged from the 2025 edition of the United States Bowling Congress Senior Championships.

Nearly 400 athletes age 50 and older traveled from across the United States and Canada to participate in the 2025 event after earning spots through either a state or province senior tournament.

Competition was held across two divisions – Open and Women's – in six age-based classifications – 50-54, 55-59, 60-64, 65-69, 70-74 and 75 and older.

Qualifying consisted of six games over two days to determine the finalists. The top six scores in each division, including handicap, advanced to the championship round.

Pinfall dropped for all finalists, but they received bonus pins based on their qualifying positions. The top qualifier in each division received 50 bonus pins, while the second seed was given 40 bonus pins. The bonus pins continued to decrease by 10 for each qualifying position.

The 2025 champions were determined based on total pinfall for their final three games, including handicap and bonus pins.

WOMEN'S DIVISION:

50-54:

Lisa Blagojevic of Brighton, Ontario, Canada, earned bragging rights in her division and for her drive back home with her performance Friday, recording the win with a 740 total.

Blagojevic, advancing as the sixth seed, rolled games of 181, 200 and 227 for a scratch total of 608, and she received 132 pins of handicap. She started her final game with five strikes to make her move away from the field.

Her husband – Andrew Blagojevic – also qualified for the 2025 Senior Championships and advanced to Friday's final round for the Open Division's 50-54 classification, finishing fourth.

Kendry Tackett of Clinton, Tennessee, placed second with 692, edging Lauren Poole of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, by two pins (690).

55-59:

Janet Brown of Agency Village, South Dakota, made the most of her third appearance at the Senior Championships, recording the top score in her division with a total of 734.

Qualifying as the sixth seed, Brown used steady games of 189, 179 and 186 for a 554 scratch score and added 180 pins of handicap.

Lydia Sullivan of Sanderson, Florida, finished as the runner-up with a score of 728, while Tammy Kutsch of Brule, Nebraska, placed third with 686.

60-64:

Kimberley Haney of Aberdeen, Maryland, also made the most of her third tournament appearance, posting a 677 total to claim the top spot.

Haney finished qualifying in third to receive 30 bonus pins, and she improved each game at Cityview Lanes, rolling scratch scores of 158, 194 and 208 for a 560 series. She added 87 pins of handicap to her final tally.

She now holds two national wins. Haney also claimed a win in Ruby Doubles at the 2021 USBC Women's Championships in Reno, Nevada.

Jackie Selders of Middleton, Idaho, was second with 643, while Valarie Schlem of Piedmont, South Dakota, was third with 626.

65-69:

Although several of the divisions in 2025 were decided by less than 10 pins for the top spot, Pam Thompson of Rugby, North Dakota, recorded her victory by the slimmest margin – one pin.

Thompson had games of 141, 154 and 135 for a 430 scratch total as the third seed (30 bonus pins) and received 234 pins of handicap to finish with 694.

Sharon Powers of Lakewood, Colorado, earned the sixth seed Thursday by one pin, but she just missed out on the top score, finishing with a score of 693. Powers – a two-time winner at the Women's Championships – finished with the highest scratch total of

any competitor on Friday (690).

Third place went to Jane Lessenger of Cheyenne, Wyoming, who finished with 672.

70-74:

Jing LeBaquin of Cerritos, California, posted the top score in her division, finishing with an overall score of 733.

After earning the top seed and 50 bonus pins, LeBaquin rolled scratch games of 190, 171 and 154 for a 515 total. She added 168 pins in handicap to her winning score.

Arlene Garcia of Manhattan, Kansas, finished as the runner-up with 715, and Wanda Kremer of Rugby, North Dakota, took third with 646.

75 and older:

Viola Forrest of DeWitt, Arkansas, won her second title at the Senior Championships, finishing with a total score of 799.

The 93-year-old captured her first win during the 2020 event in Henderson, Nevada.

She qualified as the top seed in 2025 to earn 50 bonus pins and posted games of 136, 145 and 129 for a scratch series of 410. Forrest also received 339 pins of handicap.

Forrest faced an injury which caused her to miss the 2022 Senior Championships in Louisville, Kentucky, but she was excited to be back on the lanes and surrounded by her fellow competitors as she made her way to the top spot.

Lillian Singleton of Birmingham, Alabama, was second with 734, and Shirley Bentley of Barbourville, Kentucky, placed third with 675.

OPEN DIVISION:

50-54:

James Ross of Cottdale, Alabama, settled in well over the course of his first trip to the Senior Championships this week, saving his strongest performance for Friday's final round to claim the top spot with a total of 739.

Starting with 20 bonus pins as the fourth seed, Ross rolled games of 223, 249 and 202 for a scratch score of 674. He added 45 pins of handicap to secure the title.

John Sayaloune of Scottsbluff, Nebraska, recorded the runner-up finish with 726, while Ian Noel Herda of Alberta, Canada, was third with 714.

55-59:

A big finish in Game 3 helped Steve Johnson of Rosholt, South Dakota, secure the win with a 742 total at Cityview Lanes.

Johnson started with 30 bonus pins after claiming the third seed in qualifying, but he started Friday's block with 166. He picked up the pace in Game 2 with 195, before firing 255 to close his set with a scratch series of 616. He added 96 pins of handicap.

Todd Reichenbeger of Barre, Vermont, finished second with 735. Ronaldo Maniego of Manitoba, Canada, placed third with 674.

60-64:

Kevin Becera of Mililani, Hawaii, made the most out of his first trip to bowl in the United States, claiming the top spot in his division by nearly 100 pins with a 776 total.

Becera earned 40 bonus pins based on his performance in qualifying and put together steady games of 205, 213 and 222 on Friday for a scratch set of 640. He added 96 pins for handicap.

The runner-up was Randy Fischer of Grangeville, Idaho, with 683, while Dave Kist of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, claimed third with 678.

65-69:

Susan Polis of Homer, Alaska, posted a five-pin victory Friday, finishing with a 673 total.

She qualified in third to claim 30 bonus pins and had games of 167, 178 and 145 for a scratch total of 490 at Cityview Lanes. Polis added 153 pins for handicap.

Polis edged Danny Bray of Coalfield, Tennessee, who finished as the runner-up with 668. Kirt Gundry of Lansing, Michigan, was third with 653.

70-74:

Bob Ellis of Vidalia, Georgia, recorded the win in his debut at the Senior Championships, cruising to a top score of 728.

He had set the pace early in qualifying but faced some issues with his footing in the final two games Thursday. Ellis maintained his spot as the top qualifier to earn 50 bonus pins, however.

After a 160 start Friday, he found the right look in Game 2 to start to pull away from the field with 210 and closed with 167 for a scratch score of 537. He received 141 pins for handicap.

David Long of Durham, North Carolina, placed second with 682, and Patrick Chan of Scarborough, Ontario, Canada, came in third with 653.

75 and older:

Jeff Ramp of Salem, Oregon, registered the largest total score Friday, finishing with 809 to record the win.

Ramp – who also finished as the top qualifier for 50 bonus pins – started strong with 241 and closed with 150 and 122 for a scratch series of 513. He received 246 pins of handicap.

Larry Hayes of Boone, North Carolina, was second with 735, and Sidney Rhodes Sr. of Grand Rapids, Michigan, placed third with 656.

Each winner at the 2025 event received \$700.

The 2025 Junior Gold Championships kicked off with a unique opening ceremony and PWBA telecast held in front of thousands of bowling fans in an arena setting at the Resch Center in Green Bay, Wisconsin, on July 13.

More than 6,500 Junior Gold athletes, along with their family and friends, filed into the Resch Center for the Opening Ceremony featuring the traditional athlete state walk, along with awards and entertainment, before concluding with the live stepladder finals of the PWBA Anniversary Open on CBS Sports Network.

Josie Barnes didn't disappoint the thousands of fans, claiming her second PWBA title of the year by defeating No. 1 seed Kayla Smith in the title match, 236-191, on a day bowling fans will always remember.

The prelude to the largest and most prestigious youth bowling event in the country started with a Demo Day that actually took place over two days at Buzz Social bowling center. Sessions were held July 11-12 with youth bowlers getting a chance to try out all the latest equipment from various manufacturers.

Over the same two days (July 11-12), the annual Junior Gold Trade Show was held at the Resch Expo. The trade show is the place for competitors to take care of tournament-related items such as registration, spectator pass pickup and grabbing some Junior Gold Championships merchandise from the onsite store.

The trade show also is known for the chance for Junior Gold competitors to get an autograph and picture with one of the many professional bowlers in attendance representing their ball companies.

But perhaps the biggest benefit of the trade show is the presence of representatives/coaches from more than 70 colleges and universities, allowing the competitors the ability to spend valuable one-on-one time exploring their college options.

All of these events combined to provide an electrifying start to the 2025 Junior Gold Championships.

The 2025 Junior Gold Championships in Green Bay, Wisconsin, came to a close as the U12, U15 and U18 divisions crowned champions at The Ashwaubenon Bowling Alley.

More than 3,500 United States Bowling Congress Youth members competed at Junior Gold 2025, which was spread across eight bowling centers in the Green Bay area in hopes of winning a piece of the approximately \$500,000 scholarship fund, making a run at a national title and claiming a spot on Junior Team USA.

BowlTV provided livestream coverage of every round of the 2025 event leading up to the stepladder finals in each division. All stepladder finals were taped and will be aired on CBS Sports Network.

In the end, six talented youth bowlers came out on top: Isabella Jones of Edinburgh, Indiana (U12 Girls); Noah Ausderau of Virginia Beach, Virginia (U12 Boys); Anna Antony of Farmington, Connecticut (U15 Girls); Zachary Mayne of Parma, Ohio (U15 Boys); Elena Weinstok of Costa Rica (U18 Girls); and Kaeden White of Lees Summit, Missouri (U18 Boys).

U12 GIRLS

It was the perfect end to the comeback story for No. 1 seed Isabella Jones of Edinburgh, Indiana, who captured the U12 Girls title against No. 3 seed Caitlin Stahl of Mankato, Minnesota, 213-196.

Jones previously made the U12 Girls stepladder finals in 2023, finishing in third place, and she started the title match with four strikes in a row to take an early lead against Stahl. Stahl was coming off a clean 228-193 win against No. 2 seed Stevie Newton of Hanover, Pennsylvania, to start the stepladder.

Carry became an issue for Stahl after multiple single pins refused to fall but she picked up everything she left to not fall too far behind. Disaster for Jones hit in the seventh frame when she guttered and got eight pins to give life to Stahl.

The Minnesotan bowler took advantage with strikes in frames seven, eight and nine, but a split in the 10th frame dashed the

dream for Stahl. Jones recovered from her gutter with three straight marks to clinch the title.

U12 BOYS

No. 3 seed Noah Ausderau of Virginia Beach, Virginia, took down No. seed Jaxon Wichers of Amarillo, Texas, 192-191, and No. 1 seed Nehemiah Keefer of Bellwood, Illinois, 207-164, to win the U12 Boys title.

Ausderau spent the weeks leading up to Green Bay in the bowling alley for up to five hours a day, working on his game to come into the event confident, leading to his making the show.

Wichers knocked Ausderau to the Elimination Bracket during match play and the two competitors faced off again to start the stepladder, where Ausderau fell behind with four opens in the first seven frames.

That didn't deter Ausderau, who struck the next four shots and got nine pins in the fill ball to end with 192, while Wichers needed just a mark to advance. A missed 10 pin in the final frame ended Wichers run earlier than he would've liked, losing by one pin.

In the title match, it was close up until the final few frames where Ausderau struck in the seventh, eighth and ninth frames to clinch the title after Keefer opened in the eighth and ninth for a 164. A split in the final frame for Ausderau didn't matter much, closing with 207.

Ausderau had plenty of support in the crowd as they cheered his name throughout the stepladder.

U15 GIRLS

Anna Antony of Farmington, Connecticut, took home the U15 Girls title in dominant fashion after defeating Ana Mazza of Utica, Michigan, 222-145, putting an exclamation point during a week where she held the lead almost from the start of the event.

In the title match, two opens by Mazza in the first four frames allowed Antony to build an early lead before running away with the match after four strikes during the back half of the game.

Since 2021, Antony has finished no lower than seventh at the Junior Gold Championships, showcasing remarkable consistency during her young career.

Antony also wore a pair of bowling shoes that had many signatures on them, ranging from Professional Women's Bowling Association players to international stars on the Professional Bowlers Association.

The stepladder began with Mazza and No. 3 seed Candence Van Tine of Spokane, Washington, in a back-and-forth match that saw Mazza advance with a 202 to Van Tine's 188.



U15 BOYS

Zachary Mayne of Parma, Ohio, had his sights set on what he wanted earlier in the week and accomplished exactly that, winning the U15 Boys title against Francis Johnson of Orlando, Florida, 212-196.

Mayne, a two-handed left-hander, qualified as the top seed after going undefeated in match play, beating Johnson for No. 1 seed and faced him again for the title after Johnson defeated Isaiah Durlflinger of Beavercreek, Ohio, in the opening match, 213-178. Durlflinger was seeking his second Junior Gold title after winning the U12 Boys division in 2022.

The title match didn't start well for Mayne, beginning with two opens in the first three frames (a 7-9 split and 2-4-7 miss) and fell behind early. That didn't deter the energized Ohioan as he made a small adjustment to fire off six strikes over his next eight shots while Johnson stayed in the pocket, but was unable to carry the 4 pin and 9 pin when he needed it most.

Once Mayne gets home to Parma, the celebration will continue when the U15 stepladder airs with a watch party with friends and family to see the win on CBS Sports Network.

Junior Team USA Developmental Team

The U15 division also served as a qualifier for automatic spots on the 2026 Junior Team USA Developmental Team. In the boys and girls divisions, the top two qualifiers after 26 games of qualifying, the event champion and the event runner-up earned places on the team.

U18 GIRLS

No. 3 seed Elena Weinstok of Costa Rica added her name to the history books by becoming the first international female to win at Junior Gold, defeating No. 2 seed Amber Benson of

Dunkirk, North Dakota, 183-159, and No. 1 seed Tori Franklin of Frisco, Texas, 225-192.

The right-handed Costa Rican made her country proud with the win, adding to her trophy case that includes multiple gold medals from the Pan American Games and International Bowling Federation Youth World Cup.

Her journey began against Benson with an open, but Weinstok quickly recovered from it and struck three times over the next four frames to keep the match close. Two opens in the fifth and sixth by Benson put Weinstok in the driver's seat the rest of the way, closing with 183 to Benson's 159.

In the title match, Weinstok started with a spare and three straight strikes as Franklin left and converted three consecutive 10 pins, struggling to take the corner pin out before opening in the fifth frame. Weinstok stayed clean amid her own carry troubles before striking out in the 10th frame for 225 to Franklin's 192, earning the U18 Girls win.

Weinstok will take these new skills back to Costa Rica in hopes of bringing more young bowlers to the Junior Gold Championship and keep the sport growing in the youth ranks.

U18 BOYS

Arguably, the best was saved for last in the all two-handed U18 Boys stepladder as No. 3 seed Kaeden White of Lees Summit, Missouri, shot games of 256 and 269 on his way to a U18 title, defeating No. 2 seed Chance McLane of Chesapeake Beach, Maryland, and Jos Weems of Chicago.

White took the longest road possible after losing his opening match in match play, winning five straight matches in the Elimination Bracket just to earn the No. 3 seed and face McLane first in the stepladder.

The Missouri bowler began with the first five strikes and the lead after McLane started with a flush 4 pin, double and another 4 pin to fall behind early. After two spares by White in the sixth and seventh frame, he struck the next three shots to advance to the title match with McLane falling with a 227.

White proceeded to start the final match with a spare before throwing the next seven strikes in a row as Weems struggled to get any strikes in the first five frames, save for the opening frame. Weems ended with the final seven strikes, but it was too little, too late for him as he closed out with 247 to White's 269.

White stayed composed throughout his matches, only releasing his emotions once he knew he clinched the win.

This was only White's second year competing at Junior Gold and he took full advantage of the opportunity, not only winning the title but also being named to the 2026 edition of Junior Team USA.

Minneapolis, Minnesota, will host youth bowling's most prestigious tournament for the first time when the Junior Gold Championships heads to the Twin Cities in 2026.

In addition to the Junior Gold Championships, all United States Bowling Congress Youth members will have the opportunity to compete in the Bowling.com Youth Open Championships and Survivor Tournaments, which will be conducted in the Minneapolis area, during a timeframe very similar to that of Junior Gold.

The 2026 Junior Gold Championships will run July 11-18 at multiple bowling centers in and around the Twin Cities. The Youth Open Championships will take place July 8-10, 17-19 and 25-26, while the Survivor Tournament will be held on July 17-18.

The USA Bowling National Championships also will be held in the Greater Minneapolis area during that time with competition scheduled for July 9-10.

Junior Gold week will kick off with fun-filled activities like the Product Showcase and trade show, which will take place at the Minneapolis Convention Center.

The 2026 Junior Gold Championships Opening Ceremony will take place at the Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center, which is located in Eagan, Minnesota, and serves as the world headquarters, training facility and training camp home of the Minnesota Vikings.

Although the greater Minneapolis area and venues like Cedarvale Lanes have hosted several elite-level bowling tournaments over the years, the 2026 event will mark the first time the Junior Gold Championships will be contested in Minnesota.

In addition to Cedarvale Lanes, host centers for the 2026 Junior Gold Championships will include each of the following locations: AMF Saxon Lanes; AMF Southtown; Bowlero Blaine; Bowlero Brooklyn Park; Bowlero Eden Prairie; Bowlero Lakeville; Drkula's 32 Bowl; Mermaid Entertainment & Event Center and Concord Lanes.

Regional competition is complete and finalists have been determined for the 2025 USA Bowling National Championships that will take place in Green Bay, Wisconsin, in July. The U12 division will feature 15 teams competing for a national championship while the U15 division will have 16 teams.

CBS Sports Network will once again televise the finals of each division of the event, which features more than \$120,000 in scholarships for youth bowlers from across the country.

As an added bonus this year, the finals of both the U12 and U15 divisions of the USA Bowling National Championships will be contested and taped for television in an arena setting at the Resch Center on July 13, the same day as the live telecast of the Professional Women's Bowling Association 10th Anniversary Open.

The winning team in each age-based division at each regional qualifier earned a spot at the national event, which will take place as a prelude to the 2025 Junior Gold Championships.

Patrick Waters, a former USA Bowling competitor in both the U12 and U15 divisions, is now the head coach of YBAM Rising, this year's U12 Coastal South Region champions.

Waters, 19, was able to apply lessons he learned as a competitor to help coach his current team.

"Having competed in this event as a youth bowler, I gained insight

on what the bowlers are thinking and feeling – mainly how to bowl well under pressure," Waters said. "Being able to understand, guide and overcome specific emotions has helped tremendously when we were both doing incredibly well and sometimes struggling a bit. The most rewarding part is seeing how they all work together and have fun achieving their collective goal."

It turns out that coaching is a generational pastime in the Waters family, as Patrick's dad Ryan was the head coach of the 2024 U12 USA Bowling national champions.

"The biggest thing that has driven my passion for this tournament has been my father," Waters said. "He has guided me through every regional event, tournament and league I have competed in. He also shared coaching tips for this specific tournament. Everything he has done has led me to where I am now."

Dave Kline Jr. has been a coach in the USA Bowling program for six years, and his team won the U12 title in 2022. This year, he's coaching a U15 team – DKJ Pro Shop – that won the Northeast Region championship. Kline was asked what has kept him coming back to coach in the program for all these years.

"First and foremost, it's the kids and the passion they have for the sport," Kline said. "Seeing their commitment to the sport, watching them develop their skills and sportsmanship and being a part of their growth as both bowlers and individuals is incredibly rewarding. I also really value the camaraderie and community within USA Bowling. The coaches, parents and volunteers all share a genuine love for the sport and a commitment to supporting these young athletes. Finally, there's just an electric energy at Nationals. The competition is fierce, but



supportive, and it's a blast watching them get all pumped, especially when they come through in the clutch."

In addition to the U15 team he coaches, DKJ Pro Shop, of which he is owner/operator, Kline also supports a U12 team that qualified for Nationals this year.

"It's really my love for the sport and a desire to give back," Kline said when asked about supporting two teams in the USA Bowling program. "I've been fortunate to be involved with USA Bowling for several years now, and I've seen firsthand the positive impact it has on young bowlers. My son, Donaven, is bowling with our U15 team, so I'm obviously committed to coaching the older team. The opportunity arose to support the DKJ Pro Shop U12 team at local and national events, and since this team consists of two athletes that I provide personal coaching to, I wanted to build a team around them. Ultimately, I'm just passionate about fostering the next generation of bowlers and helping them succeed both on and off the lanes."

Qualifying and match-play rounds in the USA Bowling National Championships will take place at Revs Bowl Bar and Grill in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, on July 9 and 10, respectively.

The top two teams in each division will advance to the finals on July 13 at the Resch Center.

Teams representing the Lower Great Lakes and Coastal South regions earned titles in the 12-and-under and 15-and-under divisions, respectively, at the 2025 USA Bowling National Championships.

The best-of-five match finals were taped in an arena setting on specially installed lanes at the Resch Center by CBS Sports Network. BowlTV provided live coverage of the qualifying and match play rounds leading up to the finals. For the second consecutive year, scholarship money was made available with more than \$120,000 awarded in this year's event.

Bowling out of the Lower Great Lakes region in U12, the team named Dem Midwest Boyz defeated the Atlantic East region's Lane Damage team, 3-1. In U15, it was the Coastal South region's Going For It team taking home a 3-1 victory over The Avengers from the South region.

The championship round in each division featured a four-person Baker format with the lead-off bowler bowling the first, fifth and ninth frames, the second bowler bowling the second, sixth and 10th frames, the third bowler bowling frames three and seven, and the fourth bowler bowling frames four and eight.

Bowling for the Lower Great Lakes region's Dem Midwest Boyz

in the U12 finals were Caleb Boykin, Aaron "Bam Bam" Cabiness, Nehemiah Keefer, Emmett Larson and Asa Wilson-Perry. In charge of the team was head coach Anton Collins.

Comprising the Atlantic East region's Lane Damage were head coach Douglas Ausderau and team members Noah Ausderau, Ellie Kate Murray (the lone female in the U12 and U15 finals), Chase Rudy and Bauer Wokasch.

Atlantic East got off to a good start in the match by taking Game 1, 213-183. Atlantic East managed to put together a clean game, while Lower Great Lakes suffered an open frame in the fourth and never had consecutive strikes.

Fortunes began to change for Lower Great Lakes in Game 2. After an open frame in the first, they stayed clean the rest of the way, including three consecutive strikes in Frames 5-7, for a 204 game. That was enough to collect the win as Atlantic East had five open frames and struggled to a 124 result.

Things didn't improve much for Atlantic East in Game 3 as five more open frames led to a 141 game. Lower Great Lakes overcame open frames in the second and third frames by throwing strikes in Frames 4 and 5. Four consecutive strikes beginning in Frame 8 put the game away as Lower Great Lakes ended with 206, leaving them one win away from a national championship.

Lower Great Lakes put things to rest with an impressive performance in Game 4. They started with four consecutive strikes, converted a pair of single-pin spares in Frames 5 and 6, then finished with six more strikes for 268, while Atlantic East finished with a 154 game.

For Lower Great Lakes, it was an outstanding team effort, with all five players contributing to the team's strong finish.

In the U15 division, each team featured four bowlers. Taking the lanes for Coastal South were Tristan Ellis, Liam Justiniano, Cayden Sylvester and Kristofer Wagner (member of the 2025 Junior Team USA Development Team), with head coach Eric Brewer.

The South region team was comprised of Eli Anckner, Ryan Campbell (member of the 2025 Junior Team USA Development Team and the 2023 U12 USA Bowling National Championships team), Francis "Pancho" Johnson and Ridgely Potter Jr., with head coach Mike Anckner.

The U15 title match saw a split of the first two games. Coastal South rolled five consecutive strikes in Frames 5-9 on the way to a 247-222 win. The South region flipped the script in Game 2, rolling a clean game that featured eight strikes to punctuate a 231-157 victory.

Game 3 turned out to be the pivotal point of the match. The South region team jumped out to a quick lead in that game with strikes in five of the first six frames, while Coastal South had a pair of open frames through their first six frames.

With Coastal South trailing by more than 50 pins entering Frame 7,



Justiniano left the 2-8. Instead of having him try to convert the spare, head coach Brewer directed him to grab a different ball and throw a “first ball” shot to see what kind of reaction it might give him. The result, as expected, was an open frame since Justiniano wasn’t trying to make the spare, but rather was trying to get lined up for the next game.

Things got interesting from there. Following the open frame in the seventh frame, Coastal South threw four consecutive strikes and then got nine on their final shot to post a 192 final score.

The South region team couldn’t put the match away in the final frames, failing to convert a single-pin (10 pin) spare in Frame 7, sparing in Frame 8, then suffering another open frame in the ninth after leaving the 1-2-4-10. That left them needing a spare in the 10th to win the match. Another missed 10 pin on a single-pin spare attempt cost them the game by one pin, 192-191.

Suddenly, Coastal South had a victory in a game they certainly weren’t expecting to win after Frame 7 and a 2-1 lead in the best-of-five final.

Game 4 stayed fairly close throughout. The South region team closed strong with strikes in Frames 7, 8 and 9. They entered the 10th frame needing a double and 7 pins to shut out Coastal South and force a deciding fifth game. After getting the first strike, the next shot resulted in a 2-8 leave, which was converted for a final score of 191.

That left Coastal South needing a double and three pins in their final frame to win the U15 national championship. Anchor bowler Wagner stepped up and delivered all three strikes in the 10th to post the winning final score of 199.

For Coastal South, putting together a team that could win it all and enjoying their time together meant a lot to each team member.

The win also was a nice birthday present for Ellis, who celebrated his 15th birthday with a national championship.

The 2025 USA Bowling National Championships featured 15 regions that competed in U12 and 16 in U15 with qualifying and match play taking place at Revs Bowl Bar and Grill in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, before the TV finals were moved to the Resch Center. Each team that competed in this year’s event earned their spot by winning their regional event.

2025 ITC AND ISC NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

APRIL 14-19 | SOUTH POINT BOWLING PLAZA
LAS VEGAS

The Wisconsin-Whitewater men and Jacksonville State women captured team championships, and freshmen Blake Walsh of Mount Mercy and Erin Klemencic of Jacksonville State claimed singles titles during the final day of competition at the 2025 Intercollegiate Team and Singles Championships, which were contested at South Point Bowling Plaza inside the South Point Hotel Casino & Spa in Las Vegas.

The championship rounds in the men's and women's divisions in each event were taped for broadcast and will air on CBS Sports Network.

Many memorable moments have taken place during ITC and ISC championship rounds over the years, and the title matches in this year's event only bolstered that legacy.

The ITC men's championship bout wrapped up the evening's program at South Point Bowling Plaza and saw Wisconsin-Whitewater defeat Wichita state 3-0 in the best-of-five Baker final to give the Warhawks their second ITC men's title in program history while denying the Shockers' bid to extend their own record by collecting their 14th.

It took both teams a moment to get comfortable under the TV lights, as was exemplified by the fact that Wichita State suffered three opens during the first seven frames while Wisconsin-Whitewater incurred two over that same stretch.

Nevertheless, the game was still close with the Warhawks leading the Shockers by just 10 pins heading into the final three frames.

Wichita shook off the sting of back-to-back single-pin misses in the sixth and seventh by striking out in the eighth, ninth and 10th frames thanks to single strikes from Carter Street and Brandon Bonta and a finishing turkey from senior anchor bowler Spencer Robarge.

Whitewater answered back with a double of its own in the eighth and ninth, however, with those strikes coming courtesy of Hunter Pomije and Dawson Peterson.

That meant that if Warhawks' anchor Garrett Meadows could post a double during the 10th frame, Wisconsin-Whitewater would hold off the Wichita State charge and win Game 1.

And post a double Meadows did, delivering a picturesque strike on the first shot in the 10th and then taking advantage of a Brooklyn on shot No. 2. to give the Warhawks a 213-205 opening-game victory.

Unbeknownst to the capacity crowd in attendance at South Point Bowling Plaza, that was as close as things would get.

Wisconsin-Whitewater used a five-bagger and six strikes during the first eight frames to breeze past Wichita State by a final score of 236-158 during Game 2.

Despite a lineup change by the Shockers, Game 3 brought more of the same as Wichita State managed just three strikes while recording three opens during the first nine frames.

Whitewater, meanwhile, stayed clean during the early stages and then came up with a clutch four-bagger in frames five through eight to secure the game, the match and the 2025 ITC men's national title.

Although Wisconsin-Whitewater Head Coach Brandon Mooney enjoyed hoisting the Helmer Cup during the post-match celebration, his joy was derived from the happiness of his players more than for himself.

While a certain segment of the capacity crowd inside South Point Bowling Plaza may have been surprised by the way the men's title match played out, Mooney knew going in that you have to expect the unexpected once the TV lights come on.

The 2025 Wisconsin-Whitewater championship team included Meadows, Kyle Muth, Peterson, Pomije, James Stewart, Nate VanderBeek, Leo Voss and Luke Winter.

In addition to a first-place medal and his share of the Helmer Cup, Meadows also walked away with a spot on the 2025 ITC Men's All-Tournament Team. He was joined on the squad by Pikeville's Bryce Oliver, Hayden Hale of Trine, Mount Mercy's Keaton Ostrowski and Robarge, who was named the ITC Men's Most Valuable Player.

The Chris Stoehr Sportsmanship award in the men's division went to C.J. Petrin of Oklahoma Christian.

During the women's ITC final earlier in the day, Jacksonville State was stellar, sweeping Mount Mercy 3-0 in best-of-five Baker action to cap off a dominant week of bowling at South Point by capturing the first USBC Collegiate national title in program history.

After her team punched its ticket to the women's title match, Jacksonville State Head Coach Shannon O'Keefe said that she wouldn't have wanted to bowl her girls this week as they were clearly fueled by some additional motivation after having fallen just short of capturing the 2025 NCAA Bowling Championship one week earlier – The Gamecocks lost a hard-fought battle for the NCAA national title to Youngstown State by a final score of 4-3 on April 12.

Once the TV lights came on for the ITC women's title match, however, it was clear that Jacksonville State was not about to come up short again.

The Gamecocks came out swinging from the start of Game 1, opening with a four-bagger to immediately put Mount Mercy on the defensive and open up a 44-pin lead through five frames.

The Mustangs kept battling and struck three times during the second half of the game, but two early opens were all the opening Jacksonville



State needed to take Game 1 by a final score of 218-192.

The early stages of Game 2 played out in a similar fashion with the Gamecocks recording three strikes through the first five frames while Mount Mercy was saddled with two opens over that same stretch.

At that point, it looked like Jacksonville State would win the game going away, but back-to-back opens in the seventh and eighth frames suddenly narrowed the gap and gave Mount Mercy hopes of completing a rally to square the match.

However, after Klemencic converted the tricky 8-9 baby split in the ninth frame, anchor bowler Annalise OBryant stepped up and delivered a spare and strike during the 10th to hold the Mustangs off, 183-180, and give Jacksonville State a 2-0 lead, which put the Gamecocks just one win away from bringing home the national title.

For a moment, it looked as if the Jacksonville State celebration would be put on hold as Mount Mercy stayed clean and used a pair of strikes to take a 12-pin lead at the halfway mark in Game 3; however, opens by the Mustangs in the sixth and ninth frames combined with strikes in the sixth, eighth and ninth for Jacksonville State quickly turned the tide back in the Gamecocks' favor.

National Collegiate Bowling Coaches Association First Team All-American and Women's Player of the Year Brooke Salzman struck out in the 10th frame to help Mount Mercy put up as much resistance as possible; nevertheless, OBryant only needed nine pins on her first ball in the 10th to officially lock up the win for Jacksonville State.

The talented right-hander delivered a pocket shot that left a 10-pin, which was enough to give the Gamecocks a 194-182 victory, the sweep and the 2025 ITC women's national title.

Even though O'Keefe-led teams have reached the winner's circle multiple times over the years, Saturday's win was very special for the Jacksonville State Head Coach.

Jacksonville State senior Anna Warkel was named to the 2025 ITC Women's All-Tournament Team as was Gamecocks' sophomore Dannielle Henderson, who was honored as the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Henderson and Warkel were joined on the ITC Women's All-Tournament team by Aliza Shirk from Mount St. Mary's, Mount Mercy's Salzman and Kristina Catoe of Pikeville.

The Chris Stoehr Sportsmanship award in the women's division went to Lara Kurt of Savannah College of Art and Design – Savannah.

Jacksonville State's 2025 championship team featured Keyla Covarrubias, Henderson, Klemencic, Keira Magsam, Melia Mitskavich, OBryant, Warkel and Emma Yoder.

Roughly three hours after Jacksonville State won the first ITC national title in program history, Klemencic secured its first ISC women's crown thanks to a thrilling 245-236 victory over Kylee Trexler of Louisiana Tech.

Both players started strong during the title match with Trexler opening with a six-bagger and Klemencic starting with a turkey and three consecutive spares.

Everything changed in the seventh and eighth frames, however, as after Trexler converted a tricky 9-10 baby split in the seventh, she was unable to run down the 4-pin in the eighth.

Klemencic, meanwhile, made a savvy ball change in the seventh

frame, and that allowed her to break her string of spares by recording strikes in the seventh, eighth and ninth.

Undaunted by the open frame, Trexler rebounded with a spare in the ninth frame before going strike-spare in the 10th to post a final score of 236.

That meant that Klemencic would have to extend her string of strikes by at least one more to start the 10th frame or else she would lose the match and title.

But just as she had during the ITC championship match earlier in the day and for most of the week, Klemencic delivered the shot she needed when she needed it.

Her first ball in the 10th frame finished flush in the 1-3 pocket and struck, securing the win and the Jacksonville State freshman's second national title in a little more than three hours.

Even though the championship match against Trexler went down to the wire, Klemencic's performance would still have to be categorized as dominant.

That's because one match before putting up seven strikes against Trexler, Klemencic started with the front six and finished with 10 strikes overall during a 274-202 semifinal victory over Monmouth's Jenna Lehrer.

During her two games on the TV pair on Saturday, Klemencic struck 17 times in 23 attempts and averaged just under 260.

That sort of performance is impressive no matter who authors it, but it's even more noteworthy when you consider the fact that Klemencic is only a freshman.

Trexler earned her place in the title by taking down Youngstown State's Amanda Granata by a final score of 235-213 during the first ISC women's semifinal.

The first trophy of the day was given out earlier in the day, and it went to Mount Mercy super freshman Walsh.

The NCBCA First Team All-American and Rookie of the Year capped off a remarkable debut season by defeating McKendree's Nicholas Blagojevic by a final score of 235-190 to become the 2025 ISC men's national champion.

Despite admittedly waking up with nerves, Walsh was all business once the TV lights came on at South Point.

He peppered the pocket throughout his two matches on the TV pair, striking on all 12 shots on the left lane and 17 times overall during two clean games.

He started the day with a 237-180 win over Concordia's Conner Lackey before taking down Blagojevic for the title.

Blagojevic earned his place in the championship match thanks to a 222-187 victory over Savannah College of Art and Design – Savannah's Gael Egana during Semifinal No. 2.

Walsh certainly proved just how much bowling skill he has throughout his first season at Mount Mercy, a place that has come to feel like home despite being halfway around the world from his true home in Australia.

Walsh also knows how much his family back home in Australia believes in him, so, understandably, he was looking forward to celebrating his triumph with them later in the day via video chat.

Teams and individuals competing at South Point Bowling Plaza this



week earned their spots at the ITC and ISC through four sectional qualifiers held throughout the country.

YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP AND AWARD CHANGES

The United States Bowling Congress will enact changes to eligibility policies and the application processes for various youth scholarships and annual awards starting with the 2025-2026 season.

Eligibility changes will allow any USBC member still in high school to apply rather than requiring applicants to be under age 20 as of August 1 of the application year. These changes will also extend eligibility for the Star of Tomorrow and Earl Anthony Memorial Scholarships to both juniors and seniors and limit recipients to one award or scholarship per year; however, applicants may still win each unique award – such as the Annual Zeb Scholarship, Youth Ambassador Scholarship and Star of Tomorrow – once in their life.

Changes to the application process will include requiring proof of league and tournament participation through the submission of competition scores and recap sheets, utilizing application essay prompts unique to the character of each scholarship and/or its namesake as opposed to employing a common essay prompt for all awards/scholarships and requiring applicants to furnish their unweighted GPA only instead of allowing the applicant to choose whether to submit a weighted or unweighted GPA.

USBC believes that by providing a clear set of rules, policies and procedures regarding the qualifications for each award, all parties involved can be on the same page when applying for and determining recipients of these prestigious awards.

2024-2025 DEXTER HIGH SCHOOL ALL-AMERICAN TEAM

The Dexter High School All-American Team has been announced for the 2024-2025 school year, with Tamia Yeager of Tacoma, Washington, and Drake Wait of Stillwater, Minnesota, named as captains.

Both captains will receive an additional \$500 scholarship and take home the Bud Clapsaddle Award, named for the former Dexter Bowling vice president who oversaw selection of the first 12 teams.

THE GIRLS' TEAM INCLUDES:

Malayna Calo (Riverview, Florida) – The junior has established a 5.71 weighted GPA and is ranked in the top 15 in her graduating class of 140 students at Bell Creek Academy High School despite taking on a course-load featuring multiple advanced placement (AP) and honors classes. Calo, who earned a spot on Junior Team USA's Developmental Squad in 2024 thanks to a top-10 finish at the 2023 Junior Gold Championships (U15), has enjoyed consistent success while representing Bell Creek on the lanes, helping the team to multiple Florida High School Athletic Association District 5 team titles, an individual championship and three individual runner-up performances. When not bowling or hitting the books, Calo has helped her community through her involvement in Girl Scouts and as a volunteer for Seeds of Hope, Metropolitan Ministries, Relay for Life and the Mayhem Wrestling Club.

Kyrah Durham (Mansfield, Texas) – During her tenure at Mansfield Lake Ridge High School, Durham excelled both in the classroom and as a participant in extracurricular activities such as Future Medical Professionals, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Health Occupations Students of America. She finished her high school career with a perfect 4.0 GPA, earning Teacher's Choice and Senior

of the Month honors along the way. When she's not on the lanes competing, Durham works to help build a better bowling community throughout the state of Texas by serving as Texas USBC State Youth Director, a position she's held since 2022. Her work in association leadership also led to her earning the Texas State Youth Bowler Service Award in 2021. Durham is just as impressive with a bowling ball in her hands, however. She was a three-time varsity letter winner for Mansfield Lake Ridge (2022, 2023 and 2024), a two-time Texas State All-Events Scratch champion (2022 and 2024) and has qualified for the Junior Gold Championships national finals every year since 2018.

Mylie Galigher (Bowerston, Ohio) – Galigher maintained a 4.0 GPA and established herself as an exemplary student at Conotton Valley High School, where she was a member of the National Honor Society, was vice president of her senior class and was named Academic All Ohio in 2023-2024. She stayed active in extracurricular activities as well, competing as a member of Conotton's bowling, cheerleading, softball and volleyball teams. On the lanes, Galigher helped Conotton to a record of 73-7 during her high school career. That mark included an Ohio High School Athletic Association Division II state title in 2022-2023 and another state tournament appearance in 2023-2024. This past season, Galigher earned distinctions as an Ohio Valley Athletic Conference All Star as well as OVAC and Inter-Valley Conference All-Conference First Team.

Aubrey Garton (Olivehill, Tennessee) – The senior was stellar in the classroom at Hardin County High School, where she finished her high school career with a 4.0 GPA and ranked No. 1 in her graduating class of 233 students. However, Garton didn't set herself apart due to classwork alone. She also made her mark while participating in several extracurricular activities and serving countless community groups. Garton's list of organizations served includes National Honor Society, 4-H Honor Club, Future Farmers of America, New Pleasant Grove Freewill Baptist Church, HCHS Hitmen Trap Team and Hardin County Airport to name a few. On the lanes, Garton helped Hardin County to four Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association Division I state titles. She also achieved considerable individual success, which included a fifth-place finish as an individual at the 2024 TSSAA State Tournament.

Tamia Yeager (Tacoma, Washington) – Yeager is the first three-time Dexter High School All-American in program history, having earned the honor during both the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 seasons as well. She also retained her status as team captain in 2025 after having first earned the distinction last year. Yeager is a graduate of Spanaway Lake High School, where she finished her high school career with a 3.83 GPA despite challenging herself with multiple honors and AP classes. In the community, Yeager has served organizations such as Emergency Food Network, Special Olympics,



Twin Star Community Foundation and South Sound USBC Youth Committee to name a few; however, all that time spent helping others hasn't prevented her from enjoying plenty of success of her own on the lanes. During the 2024-2025 season alone, Yeager, the 2025 USBC Earl Anthony Scholarship winner, took first at the Junior Bowlers Tour of West Seattle Girls' Scratch Weekend, finished second in the Princess Division at the Washington State Queens and was named Tacoma Athletic Commission Winter Sport Athlete of the Year.

Jerrad Barczynsyn (North Las Vegas, Nevada) – Barczynsyn was a senior at Shadow Ridge High School with a 4.0 GPA (4.95 weighted GPA). He received an Advanced Honors diploma while also earning college credit as a dual-enrollment student at both Nevada State University and the College of Southern Nevada. Barczynsyn was able to effectively balance a stellar academic career with excellence on the lanes. Among his notable bowling accomplishments are a 2025 5A Nevada High School State championship, multiple wins in Junior Bowlers Tour competition and a 2024 Nevada State Pepsi championship. He's a two-time Bobby McVey Nevada High School MVP champion and a two-time Nevada Prep All-Southern First Team Bowling selection (2022 and 2023). Off the lanes, Barczynsyn spent time volunteering at the pro shop in the Red Rock Casino where he developed informational videos on bowling equipment. During high school, his interest was sparked while taking a class in forensic science, and he will continue his academic pursuit of that interest while also continuing his bowling career at Grand Canyon University.

Josiah Casler (Lancaster, Pennsylvania) – Casler, a senior at Conestoga Valley High School, carried a cumulative GPA of 4.35 while taking numerous honors and AP classes. His dedication to his academics was rewarded with membership in three different academic honor societies: National Honor Society, Science National Honor Society and Math Honor Society. Casler was a member of the school's bowling team all four years of high school and was named team captain his senior year. He was named section MVP his junior year and was league and district MVP his senior year while earning a fifth-place finish in districts. He was named to the Icebreaker Tournament High School Boys All-Star Team his senior year and rolled six perfect games over the course of his final two years in high school while averaging 225 or better each of those two years. Casler also was active in his community with volunteer work that included organizing and operating a bowling fundraiser for Conestoga Valley Christian Community Services and participating in a mini-thon fundraiser for pediatric cancer research and care. He also is very active in his local church and community with teaching and mentoring projects.

Quinn Dean (Reynoldsburg, Ohio) – The junior at Reynoldsburg High School has established a 4.0 GPA (4.57 weighted GPA) in a curriculum that includes a number of Honors and AP courses. He is a member of the National Honor Society and participates in several clubs and activities, including Model U.N., LEO Club, Wind Ensemble Band, Handbell Choir and the tennis team. He's a three-year varsity

letterman in bowling, is the team captain and has been the recipient of the Jean Martin Sportsmanship and Leadership Award three years in a row. He has won multiple titles on the Junior Tournament Bowlers Association (JTBA) Tour and owns a top-10 finish in the 2022 Junior Gold Championships (U15 Boys division). During the 2024-2025 season, he earned first team All-Ohio individual honors at the Ohio High School Athletic Association state finals, and his team finished first in its conference and tied for first as Division A champions while Dean was named to the Division A All-Conference team. Dean also volunteers his time coaching youth leagues at two different bowling centers in the Columbus, Ohio, area (he has earned his Level 1 USBC Coaching certification). Dean intends to pursue his bowling career in college with an intended major that would involve Finance/Business and/or Mathematics.

Austin Goetz (La Porte, Texas) – Goetz has enjoyed an exemplary academic and athletic career while completing his senior year at La Porte High School. Goetz carried a 3.58 GPA (4.475 weighted GPA) while taking advanced and college preparatory classes. He is the recipient of the 2025 Ed Calcote Memorial Scholarship Award and was cited as a leader for the student-led LPSportsNET program that brings the school's sports to an online audience. He facilitated every role in that program, demonstrating exceptional leadership, adaptability and a strong work ethic, and his dedication was noted as being instrumental to the program's success. Those same attributes have no doubt led to Goetz's success on the lanes where he is both a Greater Houston USBC Youth/GHCPA and Texas USBC Youth Bowling Hall of Honor inductee. He bowled on the high school team all four years, was a three-time captain/co-captain, a three-time team MVP and four-time member of the All-District team. During the 2024-2025 season, the team won the district championship, and Goetz was the singles district champion. He is a four-time qualifier for the Junior Gold Championships, a three-time PBA Junior Southwest Regional National qualifier and a multi-time winner on the San Antonio Youth Bowlers Tour. Goetz will continue his academic and bowling career at Newman University.

Drake Wait (Stillwater, Minnesota) – This year's boys' team captain recently completed his junior year at Stillwater Area High School, where he's established a 3.91 weighted GPA while taking on challenging courses such as AP Psychology and physics. Wait is highly active outside the classroom as well, playing tuba in the school band, achieving black belt status in karate and dedicating time to his community through service to programs such as Feed My Starving Children and the Youth Mental Health Initiative. On the lanes, Wait's objective is "to be a critical and motivating member of a high performing bowling team." He's certainly been a cornerstone for Stillwater, serving as team captain, earning First Team All-State honors and recording the highest strike and fill percentages in the state with marks of 69.1% and 94.38%, respectively. Wait has also achieved success on the national stage, finishing tied for 38th in the U18 Boys division at the 2024 Junior Gold Championships. That performance was hardly surprising, however, as Wait already has seven certified 300



games and four 800 series to his credit.

TNBA YOUTH WEEKEND AT ITRC

The National Bowling Association Youth Weekend returned to the International Training and Research Center, providing seven student-athletes with the unique opportunity to receive instruction and train at the world-class facility.

The event, created through a partnership between the USBC and TNBA, took place this year from Aug. 14-16. The first year of the TNBA Youth Weekend at the ITRC was in 2010.

Over the course of the three-day program, players received on-lane training and participated in drills and classroom sessions with the ITRC staff. Participants also had the opportunity to hear from guest speakers and tour the ITRC and International Bowling Museum and Hall of Fame.

This year's seven participants included five boys and two girls.



BOWLER'S ED PROGRAM

The USBC Youth Development Team, through its Bowler's Ed program, continues to provide new and exciting ways to connect with local communities and schools to promote all the positives associated with youth bowling.

For the 2025-2026 school year, a total of 22 new schools, three school districts and one non-profit organization had the opportunity to incorporate bowling into their educational plans during the 2025-2026 school year courtesy of the Bowler's Ed Grant Program.

Bowler's Ed is a curriculum- and equipment-based physical education program designed to introduce students to the lifetime sport of bowling. Each Bowler's Ed kit provides teachers and supporting staff with the equipment and tools needed to enjoy the sport in the most convenient way – bringing a bowling-center-like atmosphere into classrooms, gyms and recreational spaces.

Each kit provides six sets of the following: a carpeted mobile bowling lane, rubber bowling ball, plastic pins, step-by-step curriculum and an instructional video on the fundamentals of bowling, which includes etiquette, safety, scoring and fitness activities.

Since 2010, the Bowler's Ed Grant Program has awarded 380 grants, impacting more than 5 million students from 47 states and provinces across the United States and Canada.



USBC SMART PROGRAM

The USBC Scholarship Management and Account Reporting for Tenpins (SMART) program is making an investment earnings allocation of \$7 million to provide additional scholarships for youth bowlers. The \$7 million allocation is consistent with funding provided since 2022 and matches the largest investment earnings allocation in SMART history.

In addition to the earnings allocation, SMART is allocating \$500,000 in earnings to support USBC national scholarship programs. This funding will provide additional scholarships to the USA Bowling program as well as other USBC conducted national programs.

In 2024, SMART processed the largest total disbursements in program history, reaching \$13 million. This exceeds the previous record set in 2023 of \$11.3 million.

Included in the 2024 allocation:

- \$2.6 million in bonus scholarships to the 7,127 active SMART Recipients. These are students who used SMART funds in 2024. Each student will immediately receive a new \$365 SMART scholarship.
- \$1.8 million in new SMART deposited unassigned funds for Providers to allocate toward future scholarships. This is in addition to the new \$3.3 million SMART deposited unassigned funds Providers received for allocation in January from expired Recipient accounts.
- \$2.6 million is set aside for the SMART Pell Grant Match Program for the 2025-2026 academic year.



PEPSI YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIPS REBRANDED AS USBC YOUTH SCRATCH CHAMPIONSHIPS PRESENTED BY SMART

The USBC is introducing a new era for one of its most successful grassroots youth events. Beginning with the 2025-2026 season, the tournament previously known as the Pepsi Youth Championships will be rebranded as the USBC Youth Scratch Championships presented by SMART.

This rebranding represents more than just a name change; it reflects a new increase in scholarship funding at the grassroots level driven by SMART. The foundational structure of the event remains unchanged with age and gender-based state champions being awarded an entry to the Junior Gold Championships.

As part of this transition, USBC, through the SMART program, is doubling the added funds for event operators, increasing the program's scholarship funding from \$150,000 to \$300,000 annually.

Delegates elected three board members and voted on four legislative proposals at the 2025 United States Bowling Congress Convention and Annual Meeting, which concluded May 8 at the South Point Hotel, Casino and Spa.

The ballot for the USBC Board election had four candidates slated by the USBC Nominating Committee – Cindy Akin of Placerville, California; Zachary Boulanger of Green Bay, Wisconsin; Chrissie Kent of Newark, New York; and Nathan Shock of Brighton, Colorado – for three open board positions.

On the first ballot, incumbent Kent (564 votes) was reelected, with Boulanger (472 votes) and Shock (436 votes) also gaining election. Akin received 313 votes. A candidate had to receive a majority of the 611 votes cast to be elected.

Additionally, Team USA athletes elected Mark Van Meter of Albuquerque, New Mexico, to the USBC Board.

Congratulations also are in order for Christopher Floyd of Lockport, Louisiana; Brooke Johnson of Olympia, Washington; and Angel Metsch of Statesville, North Carolina, who have been appointed to serve three-year terms on the USBC Youth Advisory Group.

The newly elected USBC Board and Youth Advisory Group members began their three-year terms Aug. 1, 2025.

In addition to the board elections, delegates voted on four proposed bylaw amendments (one national, two state and one local). Voting results for all the proposals are noted at the end of this press release.

In other news, in what is annually a surprise announcement, Chicagoland USBC was awarded the USBC Association Excellence Award. The presentation of national and youth awards also took place and featured seven more recipients, including the Alberta E. Crowe Star of Tomorrow Award to Gianna Brandolino of Channahon, Illinois, and the Chuck Hall Star of Tomorrow Award to Rylan Edwards of DeWitt, Iowa.

USBC Executive Director Chad Murphy introduced a new tiered certification structure for bowling centers and updates to its certification program. The changes aim to provide greater clarity, reduce costs and streamline the inspection process for centers nationwide.

Murphy also introduced a new era for one of the most successful grassroots youth events. Beginning with the 2025-2026 season, the tournament previously known as the Pepsi Youth Championships will be rebranded as the USBC Youth Scratch Championships presented by SMART.

This rebranding represents more than just a name change; it reflects a new increase in scholarship funding at the grassroots level driven by SMART. The foundational structure of the event remains unchanged, continuing to connect youth bowlers through league-

level qualifying into regional or state-level competition with age- and gender-based state champions being awarded an entry to the Junior Gold Championships.

USBC President Dennis Hacker and Murphy presented their annual reports, and delegates also heard reports and updates from a number of USBC committees, including the Strategic Planning Committee and USBC Youth Advisory Group.

During Convention week, delegates attended a variety of educational seminars. The agenda also featured presentations from USBC industry and charity partners, including Bowlers to Veterans Link (BVL), which provides recreational and therapeutic programs and services to America's active duty and veteran service men and women, and Bowl for the Cure®, the year-round fundraising initiative sponsored by USBC in partnership with Susan G. Komen®. A milestone was reached this year as the 25th anniversary of Bowl for the Cure was celebrated at Convention.
