# WORLDWIDE INFLUENCE

AS BOWLING INSTRUCTION continues its growth throughout the world, national federations have learned the key to developing a strong program is to utilize coaches who have been trained and certified through USBC.

Proof of the reach of the USBC Coaching Certification and Development department was on display at the recent World Tenpin Bowling Association World Championships.

The prestigious event, which took place in August in suburban Las Vegas, not only featured the sport of bowling's top players but also its top coaches.

There were 25 active USBC certified coaches helping guide the world's best bowlers from

46 countries.

"We have seen tremendous progress over the years, increasing understanding and awareness around the world about of the value of USBC Coaching certification," USBC Managing Director of National Governing Body Neil Stremmel said. "A growing number of federations realize that having a USBC certified coach as part of their staff increases their chances for success at the highest levels."

Five of the coaches at the World Championships have reached Gold status, the pinnacle of USBC Coaching certification held by just 24 active coaches. Gold coaches go through a rigorous process to earn the designation and are required to demonstrate knowledge of the latest techniques and information through practical application and discussion.

In addition to the Gold coaches, there were 11 Silver coaches, seven Bronze coaches and two Level I coaches assisting teams at the World Championships.

"The sheer number of USBC certified coaches at the World Championships validates that USBC Coaching is providing a top training program for the world," Stremmel said. "USBC has made coaching development and certification a priority and it's gratifying to see federations around the world partnering with USBC certified coaches to elevate the sport."

# MISSION POSSIBLE: CERTIFY 20,000 YOUTH BOWLERS IN 2014

STRIKE TEN ENTERTAINMENT and the International Bowling Campus Youth Development teams are issuing a challenge to bowling centers and associations across the country, and those up to the challenge could be rewarded with a substantial prize.

The challenge of the Mission Possible promotion, which kicks off Jan. 1, 2014, is to certify 20,000 new youth bowlers in 2014. Reaching that goal is a challenge to the bowling industry overall to raise the bar in developing the next generation of bowlers.

While putting more youth bowlers on the lanes benefits the industry in the long run, centers and associations have another incentive to actively take part in the Mission Possible promotion: A top prize of \$20,000 is up for grabs for participating centers, and the association that services the winning center receives \$5,000.

What do centers need to do to be eligible? Well, obviously, centers that participate and certify youth bowlers will be entered into a \$25,000 Grand Prize drawing to be conducted at the 2014 International Bowl



Expo in Orlando, Fla. Centers that order one of the league promotion kits will receive 20 entries into the drawing. Plus, for each youth bowler a center certifies, the center receives 50 additional entries per youth bowler into the drawing. So the more youth bowlers certified, the more entries a center receives.

"Mission Possible is further proof the bowling industry is ready to invest in our youth bowlers, and we couldn't be more excited about this promotion," IBC Managing Director of Youth Development Chad Murphy said. "Bowlers gain so much by certifying, and it's crucial to building a



strong future. The goal is set, and we hope these prizes will sweeten the deal for associations and centers to work together."

Centers are encouraged to certify youth bowlers through "8 for 8" Bowling Club programs. The shortseason program has proven to be an extremely popular promotion since its successful rollout in 2012.

The "8 for 8" program debuted as a way to introduce children to the sport by offering short-duration leagues, free USBC Youth Basic membership and a bowling ball of choice to each member. Participants competed in eight-week league sessions for \$8 per week.

In 2014, the "8 for 8" Bowling Club takes another big step with the addition of "10 for 10" and "12 for 12" versions. The new additions to the program allow for more time on the lanes and the chance to upgrade to a performance bowling ball in "12 for 12" leagues. Participating ball companies in the promotion include Brunswick, Columbia 300, Ebonite and Storm. Some of the features of

Some of the features of Youth Basic membership include a personalized USBC Youth membership card, a USBC-recognized average, the ability to participate in USBC-certified tournaments, USBC League Champion awards, USBC High Score awards and access to the USBC Youth Purchasable Awards program.

"With the early success of the '8 for 8' program, expanding the promotion to '10 for 10' and '12 for 12' was an easy decision," STE president Frank DeSocio said. "These short-duration leagues are beneficial for both the bowler and the proprietor. The bowler can test the water at a reasonable price to see if they want to sign up for a full season, all while receiving the benefits of being a USBC Youth member. The center can run these shorter leagues as it continues to build its youth program. Everybody wins."

Awards for coaches and youth leaders include the David Dahms Coach of the Year, Kerm Helmer Horizon Award and the USBC Youth Volunteer of the Year.

### record-setting year

For the first time in tournament history, the North Pointe Junior Gold Championships, presented by Track, Columbia 300, Ebonite and Hammer, broke the 2,000-participants mark as 2,080 USBC Youth bowlers took to the lanes in Detroit in 2013, an 8-percent increase over last year's total.

The North Pointe Junior Gold Championships, along with the Survivor Tournament presented by xbowling, had a \$300,000 scholarship pool in 2013. It is the most scholarships awarded in tournament history. The Junior Gold program also set records with 4,376 members and with 507 bowling centers playing host to 1,070 Junior Gold competitions.

More than 100 youth bowlers took part in the 2013 Bowling Combine for College Prospects held at the International Training and Research Center in Arlington, Texas. It was the third installment of the Bowling Combine, developed to bring together youth bowlers who want to compete at the collegiate level with college coaches looking for talented bowlers for their programs.

Using the state-of-the-art tools at the ITRC, the Team USA coaching staff put the student-athletes through tests to evaluate skills such as shot repeatability, release ratio, spare proficiency, breakpoint management, vertical leap, and balance. Coaches from 30 collegiate programs took part in this year's Combine.
