"I think it's neat just seeing the truck and everybody's layout in the truck. But, I had no idea the

guys could just go to them and that they drill 400 balls a week. Are you kidding me?"


USBC OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

VEGAS IS THE PLACE FOR HIGH ROLLERS

IF YOU BELIEVE in quality over quantity, you likely would agree the two previous times the USBC Open Championships made its way to Las Vegas provided memorable moments and had a significant impact in the annals of the storied event.

While the 2017 event will mark just the third appearance for the Open Championships in Las Vegas, and its first visit to the South Point Bowling Plaza, the tournament's Las Vegas debut in 1986 came in the

middle of a very exciting year in sports.



Series or Bobby Rahal taking the Indianapolis 500, but the Open Championships has a longer history than either event.

The 1986 Open Championships saw tournament participation top the 10.000-team plateau for the first time, as a then-record 10,019 five-player teams made their way to Cashman Center, near downtown Las Vegas. It also saw a prize fund that surpassed \$2 million for the first time.

When the tournament returned to Vegas in 2009, the glittery skyline had changed, but so did the look and feel of the custom tournament venue

The second visit to Cashman Center included the debut of the world's largest mobile scoreboard, the first change in the

scoring display since automatic scoring was introduced to the event in 1979. The venue also featured 60 lanes for the first time outside of the famed, and permanent, National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nevada.

And, the event did not disappoint, drawing the second-largest field in Open Championships history with 17,200 teams, just 85 short of the record set in 1995 when the NBS in Reno opened

its doors. The 2009 Open Championships also would break records with a 154-day schedule and a prize fund of \$7,457,566.

Among the many who cashed in at Cashman Center, eventual USBC Hall of Famer Lennie Boresch Jr. of Kenosha. Wisconsin. earned the second and third titles of his long career (Regular Team and Team All-Events) on the way to a record payday of \$18.642.

While Boresch's haul didn't quite reach the bar set by Nick Papagiorgio while on his Vegas Vacation, it's still a noteworthy mark and one that helped Boresch earn entry into the USBC Hall of Fame in the Outstanding USBC Performance category in 2012.

"Battling a team a few pairs away for the lead, and eventually the team title, was unbelievable, and it didn't stop there as we all picked up right where we left off the next night for minors," Boresch said. "It was dream come true and probably punched our tickets into the USBC Hall of Fame. That ranks as tops in my bowling career. When you win as a team, there is no better feeling. I've had a lot of great wins and moments in my career, but man, that was one special weekend. Not only the history that comes with it, but we also got paid really well!"

Much like Siegfried and Roy, the popular Las Vegas magicians known for their work with white lions and tigers, a handful of bowlers worked some serious magic on the lanes in 2009, setting records in singles, doubles and all-events, with the singles and doubles marks still standing heading into the

Longtime tournament participant Ron Vokes of Racine, Wisconsin, was relatively unknown on the national stage before tossing 30 consecutive strikes on the way to a singles set of 857 and then-record all-events total of 2,321. Scores of that nature were rare, and there immediately was eagle talk, despite it only being the end of April.

Vokes did hold on for the Regular All-Events title, but a little more than a month after his big day, Michigan's Bo Goergen flirted with perfection on the biggest stage in bowling.

After back-to-back 299 games to start

singles, Goergen added a 264 effort to cap the highest three-game series in Open Championships history, 862, to steal the Regular Singles title.

Being a part of the record-setting year in 2009 has meant so much to me in that I was fortunate to accomplish a lifelong goal in my bowling career, and to bowl a record score in the process - priceless," said Goergen, who will make his 39th consecutive Open Championships appearance in Las Vegas in 2017. "Most competitive bowlers are looking to have that accomplishment on their bowling resumes to earn the respect of other elite bowlers. That record score certainly provided that for me, and I'm humbled by the recognition I get when I walk into a center. I do understand that records are meant to be broken, and I'm fine with that. What I will have forever, is the eagle and banner from that year, of which I am very proud."

2017 USBC OPEN **CHAMPIONSHIPS**

When: Feb. 18 - July 10

Where: Las Vegas at the South Point Bowling Plaza, a \$35-million tournament bowling facility

Notable: The Standard Division for bowlers with entering averages of 181-209 debuts in 2017. The Regular Division now will be for bowlers with averages of 210 and above, while the Classified Division remains for bowlers who have averages of 180 and below.



Finally, as the longest Open Championships in history wound down, Brenda and Stephen Padilla of Mansfield, Texas, solidified their relationship, not only by their eventual marriage, but by winning doubles together at the OC.

The duo did it in record fashion, posting a 1,566 total (790 for Stephen and 776 for Brenda), while Brenda kept striking in singles, becoming the sixth woman to roll a perfect game on the championship lanes. The 300 helped her to a 2,132 all-events total, still the highest by a woman at the Open Championships.

The 2017 Open Championships will begin a new era with improvements to the divisional structure and with its debut at the new South Point Bowling Plaza. The event kicks off a decade of regular visits to Las Vegas as the tournament will return in 2019, 2021, 2024 and 2027, creating the potential for more fireworks, magic and memories.

The 2017 USBC Hall of Fame induction ceremony will take place April 26 at the 2017 USBC Convention in Las Vegas.

Logo Infusion to provide Junior Gold jerseys

Nevada school receives Grant through YES Fund

The Douglas High School Bowling Club in Minden, Nevada, is the latest recipient of a \$2,500 High School Grant distributed through the Youth Education Services (YES) Fund. The grant

program is managed by IBC Youth Development and annually provides up to four grants to high school programs that show financial need because of budget cuts or other changes. Grants also are provided to schools starting a new program.

O'Neill selected for USBC Board

Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, has joined the USBC Board of Directors as an

athlete representative. He fills the spot opened when Mike Fagan chose not to seek re-election; O'Neill's term will run through the 2018-2019 season.



A seven-time member of Team USA, O'Neill captured 24 medals in international competition, including 15 golds. He retired from Team USA earlier this year but continues to compete on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour.
