COLLEGE BOWLING

OFF TO A FAST START

AS A COLLEGIATE bowler, Katie Thornton had the opportunity to be a part of a program that was just starting out. That program would quickly become a force on the collegiate scene and the lessons learned were invaluable, as Thornton now leads a program seeking to accomplish similar goals.

Thornton is the head coach of the bowling program at Savannah College of Art and Design in Savannah, Georgia, and the 2016-2017 season



marked the inaugural season for the Bees. Her path to becoming a

collegiate coach started when she was in college.

"It was about my sophomore year of college when I realized I had a major passion for the coaching side," she said. "I really admired my coach and the impact he had on myself, as well as my teammates, and I wanted to be involved in something that had an impact on younger bowlers."

Her sophomore year of

college was 2010-2011, and Thornton was at Webber International. She was part of

the Webber bowling program that launched in 2009, and the Warriors quickly showed they had the talent to succeed.

ber International. She was a member of the staff when the Warriors won the 2014 NAIA national title.

"I did the Bronze level certification and was even more intrigued and began to find myself wanting to learn more about the game than actually physically bowling," said Thornton, who was selected to Webber athletics' inaugural hall of fame class in 2016. "I really enjoy researching and observing teams and how to advance as a coach."

She would become involved with the USA Bowling Coaching program, which provides seminars for volunteer coaches to teach them the basic skills needed so they could teach the fundamentals to youth bowlers.

"The USA Bowling Coaching program is one of my favorite things to be involved with," Thornton said. "I truly believe

providing proper coaching for today's youth is a way to help grow in the future. I have always believed that kids aren't going to want to keep bowling if they don't get better, and one way to do that is to provide local coaches with the correct knowledge to help. It's always so great to see volunteers so passionate about helping youth."



Thornton has earned her USBC Silver coaching certification and is

working toward her Gold certification. In September of 2015, she was hired by Savannah College of Art and Design to lead the new bowling program and would have nearly a year to recruit student-athletes.

This past fall, Thornton had her teams in place.

"At the beginning of the year, we set goals for what we wanted to accomplish for the season," Thornton said. "We never really focused on the outcome, but rather the improvements we needed to make to give us the opportunity to achieve them. There were numerous times during tournaments I would let the team fail in order to show them what



we needed to improve upon to succeed later on."

Both the men's and women's teams performed well enough to earn invitations to the Intercollegiate Team Sectionals in March. For the women, it was a stepping stone to the next level. At the Intercollegiate Team Sectionals in Smyrna, Tennessee, the SCAD-Savannah women's team was eighth after the opening 16 Baker games, but would put together a big block in the next 16 games to jump into second place. The Bees would finish second to McKendree, a national semifinalist last season, to earn its spot among the 16 national finalists.

"The team has worked so hard day in and day out through the season to be at their best during postseason," Thornton said. "I am beyond proud of what we have been able to accomplish thus far, and look forward to the possibilities for the rest of this season and beyond."

Leading into the ITC, the Bees had their first chance to compete for a national title at the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Women's Championships in April. After 24 games of qualifying, SCAD-Savannah would win its first match but then suffered consecutive losses to be knocked out of the doubleelimination bracket.

Now, college bowling fans can see if SCAD-Savannah can make the finals of the Intercollegiate Team Championships. In May, CBS Sports Network will televise the title matches of the Intercollegiate Singles Championships and the Intercollegiate Team Championships as part of its 23-event national television package. Tune in to see who will take home the titles.

RACE IS UNDERWAY FOR THE PWBA

THE PROFESSIONAL Women's Bowling Association kicked off its third season with the QubicaAMF PWBA Sonoma County Open the last week of April. The event also kicked off the race to determine the field for the Smithfield PWBA Tour Championship.

While NASCAR drivers compete each week for their chance to be one of 16 drivers to make The Chase for the Cup field, PWBA players will compete through early August with the hopes of making the 16-player field for the season finale of its tour.

And the racing comparison is especially appropriate as the Smithfield PWBA Tour Championship will take place Sept. 3-6 at Richmond International Raceway in Richmond, Virginia, during the track's fall NASCAR race week festivities. The finals will be televised live on CBS Sports Network on Sept. 6.

QubicaAMF, based in Richmond, will install four custom bowling lanes in the Old Dominion Building at the Richmond Raceway Complex as part of its sponsorship with PWBA,

and Virginia-based Smithfield Foods returns as title sponsor of the event for the third consecutive season.

"Many racing fans are bowling fans and this will be a wonderful opportunity to present our season finale alongside a great race at Richmond," PWBA Tour spokesperson Kelly Kulick said. "Having such a unique setting will give us the chance to showcase our sport and interact with fans. We're excited to have QubicaAMF as a



PWBA sponsor and appreciate the continued support of Smithfield Foods."

including four TV shows in 2016.


Danielle McEwan – Was in the hunt each week, making 12 match-play appearances in last season.

Stars of Tomorrow, other Youth awards

Natalie Koprowitz of Girard, Illinois, is the 2017 Alberta E. Crowe Star of Tomorrow and Carson Opela of Rio Rancho, New Mexico, was selected as the Chuck Hall Star of Tomorrow. Both were honored at the USBC Convention in Las Vegas in April and each receives a \$6,000 scholarship.

Centers can host prequalifiers for U.S. Open

Bowling centers have the opportunity to host a pretournament qualifying event for



the 2018 U.S. Open starting in November, and centers also can

submit applications to serve as host center for the major tournament.

The U.S. Open features a limited field based on the PBA Tour money list and finishes at national and international events. But, for the 2018 tournament, bowlers will have the opportunity to be part of the field through the pre-qualifying events.

Centers can apply to host a pre-qualifying event, provided the center meets certain format requirements, which include having an event with a minimum of nine qualifying games and paying the cost for one spot in the U.S. Open field. Pre-qualifying events can be held starting Nov. 1, 2017, and no later than May 1, 2018.

The U.S. Open also is seeking applications from centers interested in hosting the 2018 U.S. Open. Tentative dates are Oct. 24-31, 2018. Centers can go to BOWL.com/USOpen for more information.

Deadline approaching for Bowling Combine

The application deadline for student-athletes who want to attend the 2017 Bowling Combine for College Prospects is May 13. This year's event will take place Aug. 8-12 at the International Training and Research Center in Arlington, Texas.

At the Bowling Combine, youth bowlers are evaluated by

the ITRC staff using state-ofthe-art technology. This is not a coaching clinic, but an evaluation of bowlers so they can learn their strengths and weaknesses. College coaches also can attend, at no cost, to meet potential student-athletes.
